NOTES FROM THE CENTRAL OFFICE

Are the Winooski and Colchester School Districts Merging?

Earlier this month I was at a neighborhood party in Colchester and one of my neighbors turned to me and asked "If Colchester and Winooski schools merge where will Colchester put all the Winooski kids?" Immediately, my fear that most Colchester and Winooski residents misunderstand the governance part of Act 46 was confirmed. My neighbor assumed that Winooski schools would close and be absorbed by Colchester schools. This is not true. In the simplest form of conventional merger, Colchester and Winooski would merge budgets and school boards into a single budget and single school board. Nothing else would need to change. No school closure or consolidation.

The financial incentive is if WSD and CSD merged into a single district the new district's equalized homestead property tax rate would be decreased by \$0.08 in the first fiscal year of operation, \$0.06 in the second, \$0.04 in the third, and \$0.02 in the fourth.

So, I went on to explain the following to my good neighbor:

1. Act 46 was created to address the growing context in Vermont school districts:

- High expectations for our schools to meet the needs of today's students
- Increasing poverty and addiction rates
- Growing inequity in student opportunity and outcome
- Significant cost pressures (e.g. property taxes)
- High leadership turnover

2. Per Act 46 the preferred governance structure is a single PreK-12 district servicing at least 900 students that operates one of the these four most common structures:

- All grades PreK-12
- PreK-8 & tuitions 9-12
- PreK-6 & tuitions 7-12 or

to neighboring school districts.

• Pays tuition for all PreK-12 students

3. Given WSD's current governance structure and size (865 PreK-12 students), WSD has the following options:

- Commence discussions with neighboring PreK-12 districts to determine whether partnering would help the districts further the goals of Act 46
- Develop a plan to retain our current governance structure and make the case to the Secretary of Education that this will satisfy the goals of Act 46
- Pursue none of the above options and wait for action by the Secretary of Education and the State Board of Education.
 The WSD school board chose the first option of reaching out

4. Superintendents from Burlington School District (BSD), Colchester School District (CSD), South Burlington School District (SBSD) and WSD met in February to discuss opportunities for our districts to expand learning opportunities for students and realize operational efficiencies.

Following a lengthy and productive discussion the four of us agreed to recommend that WSD and CSD move forward in a formal manner to develop a study committee and pursue these same opportunities with an eye for taking advantage of the tax cuts that come with merger. The group felt that moving forward with four districts would be too unwieldy. BSD and SBSD remained very interested in working with WSD and CSD to find regional ways to expand learning opportunities and realize operational efficiencies.

5. At the March WSD school board meeting a motion was unanimously passed to form a committee with CSD to study conventional merger.

The CSD school board discussed WSD's invitation to participate in a merger study at their April 5th meeting and tabled a motion so they could get more information about the merger study process and WSD. WSD and CSD held a joint board meeting in Winooski on May 11th so boards could meet each other and discuss the strengths of each organizations and what a merger study entails. At the CSD board meeting on May 17th there was discussion about joining WSD to form a study committee but it was once again tabled without a motion.

While we still do not know if WSD and CSD will work together to explore and study the opportunities to expand learning opportunities and realize operational efficiencies, we do know that the WSD school board has intelligently and proudly made every effort to investigate opportunities while meeting its statutory requirements under Act 46. You should be very proud of your school board!

We will continue to research our governance options, offer the best possible program of educational opportunities for all of our students and prepare all WSD students to lead healthy, productive and successful lives. Thank you for working with WSD to benefit our students!

Top 10 Things I Like About Being on the Winooski Board of Education

I've learned a lot sitting on the Winooski School Board. I also really enjoy it. Someone asked me why the other day and I thought I'd take the time to write it down and share with you all.

- 1. Mindfulness moment. Our school has been teaching mindfulness to kids for several years now. During one of our board meetings we realized that partaking of the practice of mindfulness at the beginning of our board meetings would be a good way to model that we think it's a good practice for the kids. And it's true! But not just because it's good for the kids, it's good for us! At the beginning of every board meeting we take about two minutes to let all the distractions from a busy day move into second place as we bring our attention to the school, the kids and the work at hand. Thanks to our board colleague Tori Cleiland for leading us in these exercises.
- **2. Focus on learning.** At the beginning of every board meeting, we take time to hear something about what's going on in teaching and learning in the school. Superintendent Sean McMannon will ask an individual or a group to present something to the board. It might be something going on in teaching—a new math or reading teaching technique, or something with parent engagement creating partnerships with New American parents, or something about a new plan to better serve students—after school programming innovations or taking the time to explain a plan for a new advisory or a new schedule. No matter what it is, it brings us closer to school and reminds us why we're all there: for our children. Thanks to Sean McMannon for his thoughtfulness and dedication to bring these presentations to our attention.
- **3. Focus on governance.** One thing we DON'T do in our meeting after the focus on learning is to direct the principals, teachers or students on how to do things better. We don't

- believe that's our job. We think our job is to make the policies—the rules that govern the school—and to ask Sean to report out on how those rules are playing out. Based on what he says, we can ask for more information, change a rule or leave things be. We don't tell people how to do jobs we're not trained to do. We DO demand accountability from the superintendent and we gather information to hold him accountable from different sources. What we do is called policy governance. We're very proud of it and it's one of the reasons the VSBA recognized our efforts when they choose us for the (first ever) school board of the year award a couple of years ago. Thanks to our board president Mike Decarreau for making policy governance happen.
- 4. Student representatives. Ledania Taylor and Rainbow Chen are Winooski High School students who, besides playing in all kinds of musical projects and being wonderful human beings, represent the student voice in our board meetings. Rainbow also sits on the State Board of Education. Yep, she is one of two student reps in the whole state. Winooski! Say it loud and say it proud. In any case, our student reps offer up student perspectives on any number of things from their views on policy on down to filling in some of the gaps for us old timers about such current events like what the new advisory is like. And, one of the best things they do is #5!
- 5. Student reports. After we discuss our policy matters at the board, our two student representatives, Ledania and Rainbow, give us a report of all things school. From elementary school field trips to fundraising for the prom to the iLab share nights to sports scores, to when the band is playing out and the status of the latest Penguin Plunge fund raising, the report is comprehensive and fun.
- **6. Concern for staff.** Our board has worked hard to build an excellent working relationship with our staff

- during negotiations. Our teachers and staff work in one of the most interesting and demanding school environments in the state. They are heroes. Other schools come looking for teachers at Winooski because they know we've got the best, hardest working teachers in the business. We can't pay them what they deserve. But they don't come for the money, they come for the passion they have for students and learning. Hats off to them. My thanks to Jen Corrigan and Mike Decarreau for working tirelessly to restore the relationship between the board and all employees of the school.
- **7. Alignment.** You know how your car shakes and rattles when the tires aren't aligned? You can't go very fast and all the parts and pieces of your car wear down much faster than they should. Things start to go wrong and if you don't get your tires aligned, things are going to break. WSD is not a perfect place but I sense there is an alignment between the board, the City government and services, the superintendent, our principals and other administrators, our teachers, our children, our parents and our partners. We're pulling in the same direction. Kids are at the center of our collective vision. We're willing to criticize ourselves and we're willing to improve.
- 8. Our students. Ours has always been a country of immigrants. The Abenaki were here first of course. And since its founding, Winooski has been home to waves of immigrants throughout its history: Irish, French Canadian, Vietnamese, Bosnian, Sudanese, Nepali/Bhutanese, Karen, Somali and countless others from all over are in Winooski. And I love it. Whether your ancestors worked in the mills here when they were cranking or you parents were born far away, whatever language you use most at home, we're all here. All of

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the differences in the ways we see and move in the world make Winooski a rich mix of culture, behaviors and ideas.

- **9. Our community.** There was a time in Winooski (I'm told) when you couldn't count on the community to show up at the polls to support the school in March. In the five years I've been here, the community has shown up stronger and stronger in favor of our school and our children. Thanks to you all. I think part of that support comes from the knowledge that the school has historically done everything in its power to keep its costs down. And it continues to do so. But there are things we need that we can't afford, like transportation for our littlest students. It's a small town, yes, a square mile and all that. But tell that to a little boy or girl who has to walk uphill in the cold for 30 minutes to get to school. Parents for Change are organizing and coordinating with school, city and county officials to get some better transportation for our children. One of the things they are doing is sticking to the grass roots, finding ways to connect community members to one another to give each other rides to school. It's such a simple concept. And we can do that here because we are community.
- **10. My board colleagues.** Mike, Mohammed, Jen and Tori are all a great bunch of folks who bring thoughtful consideration to everything they do in the name of the school. It's an honor to serve our children with them.

I could go on but I'll stop there. Our meetings are open to the public. Stop by and catch our mindfulness exercise, our focus on learning or the student report. Our work is stronger when people come to give us guidance. Come down and check it out! In the meantime, enjoy the summer!




It's Not Too Late: **Summer Camp Registration Still Open**

The school year is drawing to a close at JFK Elementary. We have a lot of activities happening during the last two weeks of school:

The students leave on June 10th. However, the school building and staff are busy all summer! This summer, almost all JFK teachers are taking a one week responsive classroom course. Responsive Classroom is an approach to teaching that emphasizes academic, social, and emotional growth in a strong school community.

The JFK leadership team will be attending a one week training the week of June 20th for the BEST institute. The team will work on a school wide system for PBiS implementation; develop 3-5 school wide behavior expectations; establish a system for acknowledging students at the individual, classroom, and school-wide levels; create lessons for teaching school-wide expectations; develop consistent practices and procedures for responding to minor and major behavior problems; and plan a system for collecting and reporting school-wide data for use in decision-making.

We have summer school for three weeks this summer. Summer school will run Monday-Thursday this year, from 8am until noon. For incoming Kindergarten students, the week of July 11th is open to all students, and the week of July 18th is a call back week. For all incoming 1st - 6th graders, the weeks of summer school will be the week of July 11th, the week of July 18th, and the week of July 25th.

As we wrap up the school year, I want to take this opportunity to thank the Winooski community. I have had an amazing first year as the principal at JFK. It is a wonderful school, with fantastic students, staff, and families. I hope that everyone has a wonderful, relaxing summer!




Poetry After School

The Unheard Voices of the Youth Take Action

On April 28, a coalition of schools and colleges from all around Vermont, including Winooski High School, participated and planned an event that could change the way things are now. A single student from Harwood Union High School initiated their school's Youth Action Committee. As they grew, they decided to focus on the issue of climate change. Instead of sticking to the typical school work, they wanted to do something big; something that would make an impact. They decided to take their cause to the Statehouse Lawn.

As they knew that they could not accomplish this alone, they recruited more schools - more students. A group of student from Winooski High School was an early partner. The committee grew larger with several colleges, high schools, and environmental organizations joining; they were then able to plan the event that would make this change. Since then, this planning coalition, met every other Sunday for months, to work together to organize the Educational Youth Rally that would soon take place on the Statehouse Lawn in Montpelier. The coalition developed this mission statement:

Mission Statement: As the youth of Vermont, we recognize the dangers of climate change, and we want to shape our environmental future in a positive way in our state and in our world. Now is the time to:

- Promote conservation and efficiency
- Put a price on carbon
- Enact regulatory measures and taxes to promote clean alternatives
- End the privileges given to the fossil fuel industry
- Increase awareness among youth and other Vermonters about climate change and related issues





We will do this by rallying together to work with our lawmakers and to educate our peers.

All their work culminated in Vermont's largest-ever gathering of youth voices for the environment. Over 600 young people arrived by the busload from as far as Manchester, VT. As the crowd grew at the Vermont College of Fine Arts, students created posters and banners, and the excitement grew. Once all the schools had arrived, they began their mile-long march to the Statehouse lawn. Participants proudly held up their banners and chanted. Students from North Ridge School in Ripton carried their huge puppet-sculptures, of a crying planet and a massive footprint.

As these youths marched down the road, passersby honked, supporting them and their cause showing that

even those who are not participating, have the same passion as these students. At the Statehouse, the attendees were warmly welcomed by the band from Harwood UHS, *Peace in the Valley*. There were various stations and displays, including a "trash on the lawn" sort by students from Mt. Abe HS. Speakers included Governor Peter Shumlin and several students from Vermont high schools. Among the highlights of the

day was the crowd singing along with Winooski freshman Andy Siki, as he performed the song he had written for the occasion.

Musa Mayange, one of the WMHS students who helped organize the event, reflected on the day. "I learned a lot of things about climate change that I thought I would never know about. I felt like I was part of something big, it wasn't until then that I thought that we the youth can make a change in this world. We just have to work together and have a common goal. That's exactly what happened with this project I was part of. It took us months of planning it and it feels good to achieve what we were fighting hard to accomplish. It was a once in a lifetime experience that one that I'll never forget."

Green Up Day

Reading Plus Program Transforms Reading

The middle school students have been working diligently in Reading Plus this year. Reading Plus is a web-based silent reading program that transforms how, what, and why students read while broadening interests and building knowledge. It is the tool the Winooski Middle School has adopted as a way for all students to engage in scaffolded silent reading practice every day. Winooski Middle School students have read 7,334,839 words with 80% or higher comprehension since the beginning of the school year. This translates to an average rate gain of 73 words per minute and an average of 2.0 grade level gains. Students have achieved 225 total SeeReader level awards. Based on the benchmark assessment students just completed, the middle school had 91% of students make gains in reading this year.

Memorial Day: History Class Visits Lakeview Cemetery to Honor Veterans

On a sunny but cool spring day, twelve Winooski students from Mr. McQuinn's and Mr. Clark's U.S. History class journeyed to Lakeview Cemetery in Burlington to plant flags at veterans' graves for Memorial Day.

After instructions from Ms. Annie D'Alton, the cemetery assistant, the students fanned out through the headstones with maps and names of the veterans they planned to honor. Each team had to find a veteran's gravesite, decided whether the flag was torn and tattered, and then replace it as necessary with a fresh new flag. Ms. D'Alton instructed the students that even damaged flags would be treated respectfully. Used and tattered flags are collected and disposed of in a special ceremony conducted by the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The students saw gravestones that commemorated veterans who served in the Civil War, the Spanish American War, World War I, World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. They made a special trip to the Islamic section of the cemetery to honor those dead as well and to the grave of General Stannard, a Civil War hero at Gettysburg, which the students had studied, and several Medal of Honor winners.

After a few strenuous hours climbing through the cemetery, the students adjourned to the caretaker's cottage for homemade treats and juice, and a discussion of their afternoon. This was the first time several students had visited a cemetery, so the learning spanned personal growth as well as the subject matter.

"I was quite impressed by how the students treated the graves. They showed a great deal of respect. Both my parents are buried here, and I appreciate the students' careful attention to these graves," said volunteer Deb Light.

"Over 17,000 people are buried at

Lakeview," said Ms. D'Alton. "And around 1,500 of them are veterans. Both my father and grandfather were in Europe in two different wars. This work gives me a greater respect for what they did and how they felt about this country."

"This visit challenged students to bring their classroom experience into the community and make their learning real," said Mr. McQuinn. "History is not something we read about in a book. Hopefully, these students will go home with a better idea of what history is."

City Council Update

With warmer weather and longer days comes the time of year when Winooski is hopping with events. From Green Up Day to Waking Windows, the Memorial Day Parade, the Farmer's Market and Spring into the Arts, these events provide our residents with an opportunity to explore our City, connect with each other, and build a true sense of community. We owe a big thanks to all city staff, who work tirelessly with every event to ensure its success.

City Council has been busy laying the foundation for the next phase of growth in our little City. In May, we approved a complete update to our City ordinances, which represented over two years of work on the part of City staff. One significant ordinance change was banning the use of tobacco products in three City parks: Landry Park, West Allen Park, and the Meyers Memorial Pool. You can find the updated ordinances on the City's website.

Speaking of the pool, most of you have probably heard that, based on the recommendation of an engineer, the City has decided to close the Meyers Memorial Pool due to significant structural issues that pose safety concerns. This possibility was made clear during budget discussions this year, and funds that would have gone to support pool operations will fund activities for youth and families this summer. For more information about those activities, contact Ethan Hausman at 655-6410.

Finally, Council will be finalizing updated zoning regulations this month. Winooski's current zoning rules are from 1981, with few updates between then and today, which does not serve potential new development or our existing neighborhoods very well.

The new regulations will have a significant impact on the main access corridors to Winooski (Main St., Allen St./Rte 15, and Mallets Bay Ave.). In these areas, after substantial community feedback and design workshops, the Planning Commission recommended adopting Form Based Code. This style of zoning focuses on how the form, design, and structure of development interacts with the community. Less emphasis is placed on the type of use, and more emphasis is placed on defining clear criteria and check list that builders need to meet in order to get a project approved. Form Based Code encourages mixed use and denser redevelopment along the gateway corridors.

Thanks to the members of the Winooski Planning Commission and the folks at the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission for all of the hard work they did to bring our regulations up to date.

As City Council is asked to consider new development in our growing City, we will be focused on our vision statement, which states: "Winooski will be an affordable, livable, diverse community...that has long-term vibrancy and a small-town feel...and a mix of quality, affordable housing stock that maintains the character and aesthetics of our neighborhoods." Please stay engaged and informed as new development projects come to the Council so you have a voice in shaping the future of our City. Happy Summer!

Legislative Report: Planned Siting of Renewable Energy Projects

In recent years, Vermont has adopted commonsense strategies to combat climate change. Importantly, we have implemented clean energy solutions that are reducing our dependence on fossil fuel. Our shift to distributed sources of renewable energy has evoked a statewide conversation about how to balance our interests in a healthier, cleaner, and more sustainable energy supply with our use of the working landscape.

This year, the legislature passed a bill to enhance energy planning at the municipal and regional levels and align those plans with the location of large renewable energy projects. This work is consistent with reaching the state's energy and greenhouse gas reduction goals.

The regional planning commission (RPC) may now add an enhanced energy planning section to their regional plan, so long as it is consistent with the state's renewable energy and climate change goals. The RPC will submit a completed plan to the Department of Public Service (DPS) to ensure it complies with the state's goals and policies on energy and greenhouse gas reductions. Once the DPS has determined that the plan is aligned, individual towns can create their own enhanced energy plans that align with the regional one. If RPC's have not completed their planning, the municipalities can submit their plans directly to the DPS for a determination until July 1, 2018.

Going forward, the Public Service Board the board must give substantial deference to the enhanced plans when new energy projects are put forth for approval. Unless an applicant can demonstrate "clear and convincing" evidence that other factors affecting the general good of the state outweigh the application of the measure or policy, towns with enhanced plans will be able to determine where projected as sited.

In addition, the bill states that if the FAA requires obstruction lights on an applicant's wind project, radar-controlled lighting technology must be used. Vermont will be the first "lights out at night" state, requiring that lighting only turn on when a plane is passing. The bill also confirms that if a farmer's ground-mounted solar project is approved and is sited on prime agricultural soils, that the land will remain classified as prime agricultural soil after the project is removed. Putting a solar project on that land will not remove the classification.

As soon as the bill is signed, wind turbine approvals will be halted for 45 days while the Public Service Board drafts provisional sound standards that will apply through July 2017, when the board is required to adopt permanent rules. The rules will set sound standards for the turbines at levels no greater than the most restrictive permit the PSB has yet granted.

Managing our Forests

Recognizing the value that healthy forests have in Vermont's working landscape – and their contribution to a

healthy ecosystem – the legislature passed a series of bills to protect and maintain this precious resource.

Along with many other things, these bills encourage the collection of harvesting information - in concert with landowners and loggers, protects the right of landowners to conduct forestry operations in compliance with Accepted Management Practices, encourages succession planning by forestland owners to keep forestland intact from one generation to the next, creates a right of a person to bring a civil action for damages due to the unlawful cutting of trees, repeals the requirement that a timber harvester mark the boundaries of a harvest unit prior to harvest, and upgrade the crime of "timber trespass" from a civil misdemeanor to a prosecutable crime.

Miscellaneous Updates:

Legislature relaxed requirement on how often municipal plans need to be updated. Currently they must be updated every 5 years; now they must update every eight years.

The legislature ensured that conservation easements that were always meant to be perpetual are in fact perpetual. These easements do not have to be rerecorded every 40 years and if a tax sale occurs on the property this legislation ensures the easement remains with the property.

Myers Memorial Pool Update

Over the past few months staff from the City's Community Services and Public Works Department have been working (with strong support from a group of volunteer residents, as well as with the Greater Burlington YMCA) to assess the existing conditions of the Myers Memorial Pool, and to make a determination as to whether to open the facility for the summer of 2016. The City contracted with an engineering firm with significant experience in aquatics to assess the Pool and provide recommendations for what it would take to safely open for this summer. "Based on the findings from that visit, and after weighing all our options, we've made the very difficult decision that we will not be opening the Myers Memorial Pool for this summer, and instead will be moving ahead with temporary alternative plans for swimming and recreational opportunities for the Winooski community," said Ray Coffey, Community Services Director with the City of Winooski. The City is working closely with the YMCA to finalize the details of what these alternatives will

look like (including both swimming and non-swimming options for youth and families), and will begin advertising these in the coming weeks.

"There was a laundry list of concerns highlighted during the engineer's site visit, and while some would be pretty easy to address, many of the bigger items had serious safety ramifications for both staff and swimmers," said Coffey. "In our estimation, the resources needed to address them did not make sense for a facility that we know we would be closing after this year anyway. This feels like a decision that we must make in order to uphold our job of keeping people safe, and also being responsible stewards of public funds."

There will be a full report on the engineer's findings that will be made publicly available via the City's website (www.winooskivt.org) in early June.

Work is underway on a replacement plan for the Myers Pool Facility, and there is a volunteer Pool Feasibility and Design Team meeting regularly to discuss next steps and move the City towards a draft plan for pool replacement. These meetings, which are open to the public, will be advertised on the City's website as they are scheduled. There will also be a significant public engagement process over the summer months in an effort to create a replacement plan that meets the community's needs and interests, both current and future. "This is not a decision we came to lightly, and we want to acknowledge that this has real impact on our residents," said Coffey. "The public turned out en masse back in January when this was discussed as part of the City's budget process, and we really hope that passion and energy will be part of our efforts to plan what's next, both short and long term." Health Office News

What a busy year it has been! On average our health office has seen about 100-150 students per day, 30-40 prescription medications daily administered, numerous students sent to the dentist via SSTA transport and triaged hundreds of phone calls. The health office wishes to extend a HUGE THANK YOU to the following people and businesses: Dr. Andrea Green, our medical liaison, Christina Rohne, substitute nursing assistant, Arlene Mathewson, substitute nurse, Judy George, substitute nurse, Sharonlee Trefry, State School Nurse Consultant, UVMMC-Pediatrics, VT Dental, SSTA, CHC, VDH, TLC nursing, UVMMC Diabetes Education team, St. Mike's Rescue, the district's medical emergency response team(MERT) and other local pediatric offices. From the bottom of my heart, thank you for helping me service the needs of the Winooski students throughout the year. I appreciate each one of you.

We will be hiring a new school nurse to work along side of me for the next school year. I am confident that we will find the perfect match for this health office and I am excited to introduce them to you next fall.

On another note...

While you are soaking up the summer rays(with your sunscreen on of course) by the poolside or lake over the next couple of months please take a minute to think about what your child will need before they return to school in the fall.

If your child is going to be a kindergartner then he/she will need an updated copy of immunization records. Please make sure they have had 5 doses of DTP/Dtap, 4 doses of IPV, 3 doses of Hepatitis B, 2 doses of MMR and 2 doses of Varicella. If they don't then please call your child's primary doctor to schedule an appointment for them.

If your child is entering the 7th grade then please make sure they have had their 2nd dose of Varicella and a tdap booster.

Do you exempt your child from immunizations? If so then please make

sure to stop by the health office before June 10th to fill out a form for next school year. Otherwise, they will be available with your school's administrative assistant over the summer.

Remember without updated immunizations, a renewed exemption form or a doctors note stating their next appointment they can't start school in the fall!

Does your child have asthma? If so, then please get those asthma action plans completed over the summer and have an inhaler and/or spacer ready to bring in the first day of school.

Does your child have an epi-pen? If so, then please get updated doctor's orders for them and have the new orders and epi-pen ready to bring in on the first day of school.

I have enjoyed serving the health needs of your kids this school year and wish everyone a safe, happy and healthy summer vacation.


