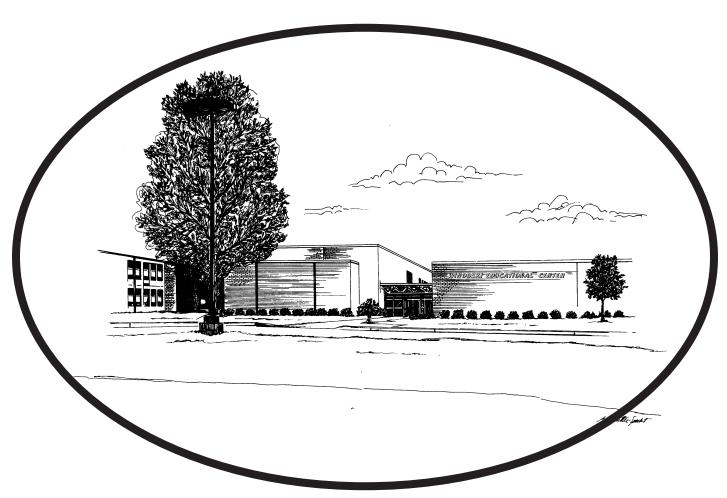

WINOOSKI INCORPORATED SCHOOL DISTRICT 5 MARCH 2012 AND 6 MARCH 2012

The legal voters of the Winooski Incorporated School District in the City of Winooski, Vermont are hereby warned and notified to meet at the Performing Arts Center, Winooski Educational Center on Monday, March 5, 2012 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article I, Article II, and Article III and to conduct an informational hearing on Australian Ballot questions, and the meeting to be adjourned to reconvene at the Winooski Senior Citizen Center, Barlow St., on Tuesday, March 6, 2012 to transact any business involving voting by Australian Ballot, said voting by Australian Ballot to begin at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to close at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

The legal voters of the Winooski Incorporated School District are further notified that voter qualification, registration and absentee voting relative to said annual meeting shall be as provided in Chapters 43, 51 and 55 of Title 17 and §473 and 553 of Title 16, Vermont Statutes Annotated.

ARTICLE I: Elect a Moderator, Treasurer and Clerk.

ARTICLE II: Shall the District accept the 2012 Annual Report and all included sub reports?

ARTICLE III: Shall the Board of School Trustees be authorized to allow appropriate groups and agencies to use school facilities and equipment in accordance with District policies?

AUSTRALIAN BALLOT ARTICLES

ARTICLE IV: Shall the District accept and expend the sum of One million, Three hundred ninety-eight thousand, and sixty-three dollars (\$1,398,063) or whatever sum is provided by federal programs for the support of compensatory education and special programs? Said sum shall be exclusively federal funds received by the District. (No local or statewide school property taxes included in these funds.)

ARTICLE V: Shall the District vote to appropriate the sum of Twelve million, Four hundred seventeen thousand, six hundred sixteen dollars (\$12,417,616) for the support of public schools for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013? Said sum shall include the amount anticipated from state and federal education aid and reimbursements, except as provided in Article IV above, and all other sources of revenue.

ARTICLE VI: Shall the Charter of Winooski School District be amended as follows (new material underlined):

FIRST: § 23-3. Annual district meeting

The annual district meeting shall be held on the first Tuesday of March and the immediate preceding Monday as follows:

- (D) Elect a school district treasurer whose duties authority and responsibilities shall be those established by law.

SECOND: § 23-7. Australian Ballot

All questions at any annual or special meeting, except for the acceptance of the annual report and the election of school district officers other than the board of trustees and the school district treasurer, shall be voted by Australian ballot. The election of school district officers other than the board of trustees and the school district treasurer, the acceptance of the annual report, and public discussion of Australian ballot issues shall be on the day preceding the Australian ballot.

THIRD: 23-17 District Treasurer

The school district treasurer shall:

- 1. Deposit in the school account school tax levies paid over and received as well as state education spending payments, and all other state and federal public education payments.
- 2. Serve as a member of the board of abatement.
- 3. Keep an account and registry of monies, bonds, notes and evidences of debt paid or delivered to or issued by the school district, and monies received and disbursed for the school district, which accounts shall be open to the inspection of persons interested.
- 4. <u>Invest and reinvest monies received on behalf of the school district with the</u> <u>approval of the board</u> of school trustees.
- 5. Keep uniform accounts.
- 6. Appoint an assistant district treasurer and revoke any such appointment at any time, and to file notice of such appointment and revocation with the school district clerk and school board of trustees.
- 7. Keep a record showing the amount of taxes voted for the support of the school district.
- 8. Pay orders drawn by the board of school trustees, keeping a record thereof.
- 9. Settle with the person conducting the audit required under Section 23-16 thirty days prior to each annual school district meeting, and at such other times as the board of school trustees may require.
- 10. <u>Upon retirement or resignation, immediately pay over to his or her successor all funds in his or her possession belonging to the school district, together with all official books and records.</u>
- 11. Keep in a separate bank account all monies appropriated or given for the use of the school district.
- 12. <u>Procure and maintain a personal bond in such sum as the board of school trustees shall determine, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the school district treasurer's duties.</u>
- 13. Prepare an annual report and deliver the same to the board of school trustees within sixty days following the close of the school district's fiscal year.

Fellow Winooski Citizens:

It is with great pleasure and excitement for the future of the Winooski School District that I write to you today. So much has been accomplished in the last year and there is so much more to look forward to in the next!

Let me start by thanking all of you for the amazing support you have given this district over the years. I cannot stress enough how important that support is. The Winooski School District is unlike any other district in Vermont, with unique opportunities and challenges no other district in Vermont can claim. It's only with the continued support and involvement of the amazing Winooski community that the District can continue to meet our stated goal of ensuring the growth and success of all of our students through continuous improvement. In other words, we can't do it without you.

And we're going to need to ask you for a little bit more this year than we have in a number of years. But before I get to that, I want to talk a little bit about a couple of the great things that have happened in the district recently.

Any discussion of the last year has to include recognition of the amazing work done by collaborators in Winooski and Burlington around the Nellie Mae grant. Two summers ago the two districts received a joint planning grant from Nellie Mae that has allowed us to chart a whole new course for education for our students. The amazing work that has been done by collaborators in the two districts brought together by this planning grant – administrators, teachers, students, parents and community members of all types – in pursuit of this goal cannot go unrecognized. And it's likely that very soon, because of their great work, we will be receiving a much larger implementation grant from Nellie Mae that will allow us to turn all their great ideas into a new education reality for Winooski and Burlington.

So what does that mean, you might ask? The main focus of the Nellie Mae grant will be to completely change the way we educate our children, to one that is much more student-centered. Every student will have their own personal learning plan to help guide the course of their learning both inside and outside of school. Every student's plan will be different, allowing all students to better learn what they need to learn to be successful, in the way that works best for them. Additionally, the grant will allow us to aggressively pursue a more technology driven education system, including one-to-one laptop computers in the High School (and eventually the Middle School), so that all our students are better prepared for the world that awaits them after graduation.

In the last year we also completed a redesign of the parking lot that included the long overdue addition of sidewalk connections to Main Street. Perhaps the most amazing thing about this project was the way the District and the City of Winooski were able to come together and collaborate like never before, sharing resources and personnel and getting the job done. Additionally, the project was entirely paid for without the need for borrowing any money thanks to our capital reserve. Also, thanks to some unexpected federal ARRA funds and lower than anticipated special education expenses this year, we should be able to end the budget year with enough funds in the capital reserve to complete the repaving of the parking lot this coming summer – again, without the need for any borrowing.

I could really go on and on about the past, but the reality is that education is and should be about the future. As you will see in the following pages, the District is asking for a bit more from you financially than we have in some time. The Board as always has tried to keep the budget down as much as possible,

but the reality is, it is well past time to invest more in the education of Winooski's children. With that in mind, I'd like to quickly summarize where most of the budget increase you will see comes from.

- Increased costs and contractual obligations: Much of the budget increase is due to contractual obligations to our professional staff. In addition, our share of health care costs is projected to rise 3.5 percent and our share of dental costs is projected to rise 2.5 percent. These are not costs that we have much control over at this point.
- Added positions in ELL and math departments: The Board asked the administration at the beginning of this year's budget season what they needed most to improve the education of all of Winooski's students. These are two things they and we feel are absolutely essential. The reality is English Language Learner (ELL) students now make up approximately a third of our High School population. Adding two new ELL professionals to the High School not only will help these students have a better chance of success, but takes pressure off of other educational personnel, allowing them to better focus on all students. Additionally, adding one-and-a-half math interventionists will help students to strengthen their general math skills, which should help raise scores not just in math, but across the board.
- Matching grant funding: One of the requirements for the Nellie Mae implementation grant I talked about above is that the District budgeted \$80,000 toward beginning the transition to one-to-one computers and other technological improvements. The Board felt it was necessary and prudent to put this in the budget as whether or not we get the implementation grant, this is a goal we will want to move toward in the coming years.

We on the Board know it may seem like we are asking for a lot, but we also feel that the time is right to make these investments. We hope we will continue to have your support as we strive to ensure that this District provides the best possible education to all of Winooski's children – the education they deserve. Remember, we can't do it without you.

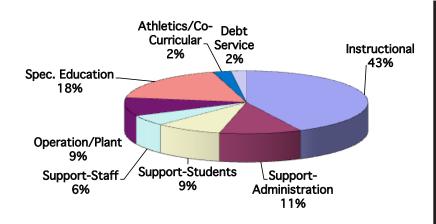

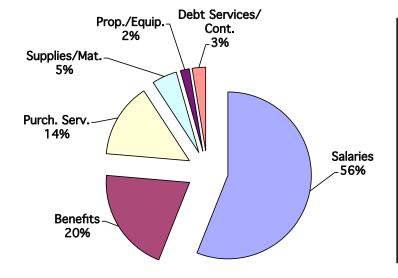

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FY '13 BUDGET INFORMATION

WHAT IS INCLUDED IN THE FY '13 WARNING?

ARTICLE I, II, III: These Articles are self-explanatory.

ARTICLE IV - FY '13 FEDERAL BUDGET: Each year, the Winooski School District receives Federal Funds for designated programs. This Article allows the School District to accept and expend these funds. This article has no effect on the property tax rate.

ARTICLE V - FY '13 REGULAR BUDGET: The School Board used a modified zero based budget process. The administrators, board and budget advisory committee members worked hard to maintain current programs while containing costs.

WHAT IS DIFFERENT IN THIS YEAR'S BUDGET?

The FY '13 budget maintains all current programs. Contractual obligations and utilities continue to be a significant portion of the budget. We have added 2.0 FTE English Language Learner teachers to meet the needs of our New American students. 30% of the student population is comprised of non-English speakers. Our students from around the world provide all students with an opportunity to learn about other cultures while learning to respect differences. This results in a rich learning environment!

1.5 FTE math positions have been added to the high school. Students entering high school below grade level will participate in a math intervention program in addition to their regular math class. Research shows that students require 60 minutes of math daily in order to improve outcomes.

The Nellie Mae Grant required us to contribute \$80,000 toward the one-to-one initiative (laptop computers) at the high school. Technology will become an important instructional tool as we move toward personalized student learning plans. The use of technology for all students will increase learning time outside the school walls. Students will be provided with new opportunities to achieve, demonstrate and celebrate proficiency.

Our conservative approach to school finance has served the Winooski community very well over the past few years allowing for minimal tax increases. The new positions in this year's budget are necessary in transforming the high school and improving student outcomes.

ARTICLE VI - CHARTER CHANGE: Article VI on the ballot was requested by a community member. This article would amend the Winooski School Charter. The School Treasurer would no longer be a vote from the floor at the Annual meeting. The position would now be voted on through Australian ballot. The amendment to the charter outlines the role and responsibilities of the school treasurer.
