Also, this budget includes funds to continue supporting a student transportation pilot project which will transport students who live over .75 miles away from school to the district each morning from December through March.

The bottom line shows a a spending

increase of 5.83% and an estimated tax increase of 2.9%. The biggest positive contributor to the estimated tax rate is the increase in our student population and Equalized Pupil Count which decreases the tax rate by 2.12% resulting in an overall decrease in spending per equalized student from \$13,986 in the current year to \$13,808 in FY19 as you will see on the ballot. The most recent Per Pupil Spending rankings (2017) show WSD is 197/266. The Board of Trustees continually works with the administration to invest in the needs of our complex student population while respecting the increasing issue of affordability.

VT high schools are required to have a program of proficiency-based graduation in place by 2020.

COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

WHS students have been building their post-secondary aspirations by visiting local college campuses this fall and meeting with college staff and students. VSAC has adopted our senior class in an effort to support all seniors in completing their Financial Aid forms.

The WMS 6th grade academy performed the Spartan Circus for JFK students as the culminating event for its "Rules to Live By" Learning Expedition. All 6th graders participated in a 6-week residency with Circus Smirkus supported by a Flexible Pathways grant from the Vermont Agency of Education.

Each JFK class participated in the "Hour of Code," a global movement to introduce students of all ages to coding and computer science. Students were able to build their own online mazes that they had to maneuver a character through, construct a galaxy with code, or create their own Google logo using Scratch.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

WSD has partnered with local restaurant Waterworks for monthly visits where our students get to learn about the various aspects of the hospitality and food service industries including learning about what skills employers are looking for, completing a job application and cooking and sampling the delicious Waterworks fare.

Also, JFK 4th and 5th graders are working on their financial literacy skills through the Money\$ense program with staff from Opportunities Credit Union

Lastly, WSD continues to support our community by raising over \$50,000 in the past four years for VT Special Olympics by jumping into icy Lake Champlain for the Penguin Plunge and over \$3,000 for the UVM Children's Hospital.





HEALTHY, PRODUCTIVE AND SUCCESSFUL LIVES

WSD continues to focus on improving student's readiness to learn through multiple aspects of wellness. All students receive free breakfast and lunch, and supper if they attend an after school activity through the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP). In addition, JFK students start their day with "Breakfast-In-The-Classroom" and eat a healthy snack in the afternoon through the Fresh Fruits & Vegetable program.

WMHS has worked diligently to establish a fabulous Advisory Program so all students are known well by at least one adult and have a trusting small community of their peers within our Middle/High School.

Lastly, WSD is incredibly fortunate to have received an anonymous grant from a generous donor for the second year running for the basic needs of our students. We were able to supply a ton of winter clothing, food and other financial assistance to our students and families this year!

Equalized Student Spending and Tax Impact

Due to the complex statewide funding formula for education, the answer to the question 'How will this affect my taxes?' can only accurately be answered with "It depends."

The two main dependencies are adjusted gross household income and house value. As you can see from the two tables below, if your household income is under \$99,000 for the year, then your taxes are based on a percentage of income. ISSUES TO BE VOTED ON

Property Tax Relief

If your adjusted gross household income is less than \$147,500 you may be eligible for a reduction of your education property taxes. Please file Form HS-122/Schedule HI-144.

Eligibility for property tax relief is based on your household income, home value, and city school tax rate, and will be applied to your 2017-18 tax bill. Renters with household income of \$47,000 or less may also be eligible. The maximum 2019 Property Tax Adjustment is \$8,000.

Instructions and forms are in the Vermont income tax booklet, which is available in post offices, libraries, city/town halls or from the Vermont Department of Taxes. Forms can be downloaded at http://tax.vermont.gov/research-and-reports/document-library/tax-forms/individuals

BALLOT QUESTIONS

ARTICLE I:

Elect a Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE II

Shall the District accept the 2018 Annual Report and all included sub reports?

ARTICLE III:

Shall the Board of School Trustees be authorized to allow appropriate groups and agencies to use school facilities and equipment in accordance with District policies?

AUSTRALIAN BALLOT ARTICLES

ARTICLE IV: Shall the District accept and expend the sum of Two million, Three hundred Seventy-six thousand, and Two hundred thirteen dollars (\$2,376,213) or whatever sum is provided by federal programs for the support of compensatory education and special programs? Said sum shall be exclusively federal funds received by the District. (*No local or statewide school property taxes included in these funds.*)

ARTICLE V: Shall the District vote to appropriate the sum of Sixteen million, Eight hundred thirty-seven thousand, Three hundred fifty-seven dollars (\$16,837,357), which is the amount the school board has determined to be necessary for the ensuing school year? It is estimated that this proposed budget, if approved, will result in education spending of thirteen thousand, Eight-hundred ten dollars (\$13,810) per equalized pupil. The projected spending per equalized pupil is 1.2% lower than spending for the current year.
