
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Penguin Plunge and Unified Sports 2019 Recap

NOTES FROM THE CENTRAL OFFICE

Investing In the Future of Winooski!

In the spring of 2013 when I was interviewing to become your superintendent I did my homework on several aspects of the organization to assess where the strengths, immediate needs and long-term needs existed. It was clear that the board and staff had been good stewards of the facility and had addressed various needs over the years through a number of projects. At the same time, our building was constructed in 1964 so it is over fifty years old. Instructional practices, how students learn, and family and community needs have shifted dramatically since the 1960s. In addition, our student population has grown and is projected to continue adding up to 200 students in the next ten years.

In the spring of 2017 the school board provided an initial investment from the Capital Reserve Fund to conduct a feasibility study which is an assessment of the practicality of a proposed project. Basically, we had an engineer work with our Facility Supervisor to determine the overall system needs (e.g. HVAC, security) and where and how we could add additional space. Following this study we started a WSD Capital Project Committee (CPC) made up of stakeholder representatives and partnered with architecture and interior design firm from Burlington, TruexCullins. Managing Principal David Epstein and Associate Cam Featherstonhaugh from TruexCullins are guiding our committee through a comprehensive process to determine our needs, produce designs and communicate the possibilities to the broader Winooski community.

Since the fall of 2017 WSD Capital Project Committee (CPC) has been hard at work! We began with building a project schedule, researching modern learning environments, conducting a visioning workshop using the Design for the Whole Child Framework, developing Guiding Statements, assessing programming needs and constructing concept designs. The following outlines our challenges, how this would improve the learning environment and how we can limit the impact on local taxes.

Challenges

- Crumbling infrastructure:
 - » Outdated plumbing, electrical, heating, and ventilation systems
 - » Total roof replacement
 - » Insufficient insulation and windows
 - » Antiquated fire alarm/evacuation/security system
 - » Inadequate power and data systems
 - » Lighting systems are outdated, past their expected lifespan, and do not provide high quality or efficient light.
- Inadequate space to provide required literacy, math, special education and English Language Learning (ELL) supports
- Not enough Pre-Kindergarten space to meet demand
- "Gymeteria" with unhealthy decibel levels during lunch
- Small and old Performing Arts Center (PAC)
- 1950's and 60's classrooms that do not support collaborative learning

Improving the Learning Environment

- Pod design in WMS and JFK enhances collaboration and team-based approach to instruction and learning:
 - » Project-Based Learning (PBL) and Expeditionary Learning (EL)
- Doubles capacity for PreK and furthers our vision for PreK-12 learning continuum
- Provides adequate space for essential support services such as literacy, math, special education and English Language Learning (ELL)
- Creates a safer and more welcoming central entryway for families, community members, and visitors
- Improves learning conditions for all:
 - » Climate control so building temperatures can be managed more precisely and efficiently
 - » More natural light and clean, fresh air
 - » Drastic reduction in decibel levels in the cafeteria

How Can We Reduce the Tax Impact?

- The WSD FY20 Budget hires a full-time Development & Communications position that will focus on fundraising for the Capital Project in the first few years
- A bill has been introduced in the VT legislature and cosponsored by Winooski Reps. Gonzalez and Colston to bring back School Construction Aid up to 30% of the approved cost of voter-approved projects
- Winooski is a "receiving" city and local taxes contribute ~40% to the WSD school budget. The other 60% comes from:
 - » Non-Residential Property Tax
 - » Sales & Use Tax
 - » Purchase & Use Tax
 - » Meals & Room Tax
 - » Lottery

School Board Update

As a society we've collectively, whether we remember it or not, have moved through time frames defined purpose, understandings, and capabilities: the Agricultural Age, the Industrial Age, and the most recent, the Information Age, centered on the "labor of knowledge". Now, a new age is upon us: the Conceptual Age.

One description: "Higher order thinking and creative problemsolving are the new in-demand skills in the 21st century, and they rely

on our ability to find meaning, to see things that exist outside of raw facts and numbers, to see the beauty and identify meaning in patterns and creatively use our insights to solve problems that cross a variety of different fields."

The good news is Winooski Schools are on it! We've been shifting our educational system to cultivate, grow, and highlight these types of skills in our student body. And the Department of Education has mandated this type of educational system because it is equitable for all types of learners.

And YOU took part in it. Here is a reflection of our journey together:

- In 2013, the Board held a community forum to involve parents and community to guide creating our organizational target and promise, our ENDS statement: All students will graduate from the Winooski School District (WSD) college and career ready at a cost supported by a majority of the Winooski community. WSD students will lead healthy, productive and successful lives and engage with their local and global community.
- In 2013, a two-year, multi-stakeholder committee (students, faculty, parents, admin, community members) actively advised the school on the creation of our six GXs.
- In 2013, the state of Vermont passed Act 77 into law to
 ensure that all Vermont students have access to high-quality
 educational experiences that best prepare them for life after
 graduation, which includes graduating in a proficiency,
 personalized educational system.
- In 2014, the state of Vermont enacted rules for Education Quality Standards. We call them Graduation Expectations (GXs). Done!
- In 2014, the Board began to hold roundtable forums, at our board meetings, with voices from our direct and larger communities to began to interpret our ENDS statement to shape metrics to measure our target and promise for Winooski students. We invited groups from local colleges, careers, local & global engagement agencies. What they want to see from our students are skills that define the Conceptual

Age and are embedded in our GXs and in our classrooms. These groups confirmed the target and promise we made to the Winooski community.

It hasn't been perfect, it hasn't been easy, and it has moved us forward! Winooski Schools are a bright spot in Vermont for the type of educational system that holds the most promise for all types of student learning. We've kept our student's wellness, learning, and engagement

at the center of what we strive to do every day, and we've kept asking for input from parents, students and community every step of the way. We did great work together!

OUR NEXT BIG STEP: THE CAPITAL PROJECT

As is our practice and habit, a multi-stakeholder group was formed in 2018 to move through a thoughtful process to address the state of our school buildings. The good news is our buildings have outlasted expectations, getting every dollars worth of investment. Also good news, our student population is growing unlike most areas in Vermont. The tough news is we do need to fix the infrastructure of our buildings. Yet, this does give us the opportunity to shape a much needed updated facility to match and enhance our 21st century teaching and learning system for now and into the future. The heart of the process and design were rooted in wellness, learning and engagement — you got it, Conceptual Age elements.

Winooski Schools have made dynamic changes by listening to and acting on the voices of students, parents, and community. So deepen your understanding of the Capital Project and add your voice to the mix! There are tours of the facility, there are two scheduled breakfasts, and there is an opportunity to host a community conversation at your house. Speaking of infrastructure, bidding and construction of the pool is to begin late this Spring or early Summer, and final engineering for Main Street will begin soon.

On a personal note, I want to thank voters for supporting me as the new Mayor of Winooski. I'm honored to receive the support, to be a part of an historical election as the first woman elected to the role, and I am dedicated to serving my community. 



A Lifetime Devoted to Improving Our Communities

Sister Pat McKittrick believes that true wellbeing extends beyond hospital walls. Her work in the Health Ministries Program - a part of Community Health Improvement - is in many respects a precursor to the concepts behind population health, and unquestionably an invaluable source of support for many in our communities.

Sister Pat started the Health Ministries/Faith in Action Program in 1994. Her work, which has taken on many forms over the years, is focused on improving people's physical, social, emotional, spiritual

and psychological health by strengthening existing community partnerships and making them self-sustaining, both in Winooski and surrounding areas.

Much of that work has been carried out by what is now called the Winooski Peace Initiative, a group of organizations including UVM Medical Center departments, local churches, businesses, schools, other city agencies and more to work together to make improvements in the lives of our community members. Work made possible by this group includes:

- Ensuring that people have access to healthy foods through programs like the Summer Lunch and Activity Program, which provides food and activities for school children whose families might not otherwise be able to afford them
- Raising awareness of diversity and cultural issues in Winooski schools and the community through programs that include sponsoring the reading and sharing inspirational books in our schools
- Promoting safety and non-violence through programs like
 a free self-defense class for women; and establishment of
 a multi-disciplinary committee to address education and
 awareness around the subject of vulnerable adults, some of
 whom may be victims of abuse

Sister Pat says she comes by this work naturally through a blend of nature and nurture: raised in Jersey City, her father was social justice-minded, and she saw in her neighborhood plenty of people who had less. Through her training as a nurse, then joining a convent in Montreal, she traveled to places around the world where, again, she gained a perspective on what it means to "have" – and "have not."

"That perspective has fueled my work," she says. "I've seen firsthand how, even though there's a scale of 1-12, not everything

is a 12. But we have to come together to do something when the scale starts tipping towards a 12."

She's always looking for ways to be creative in addressing the needs of our community. She serves on the Board of the Winooski Food Shelf. She has been involved in implementing innovative programs like "soul collage," an exercise in which individuals can post images that they find meaningful to share as they feel comfortable. "It helps people forget the problems of everyday life," she says, "and reconnects us all

to what's important."

And for Sister Pat, what's most important is our community. "That's what drives everything," she says. "How can we come together as a community to be our best?

This award is given to a person who has worked in antisexist endeavors and who has drawn connections between various communities to end multiple forms of oppression. This award recognizes that various forms of oppression (e.g. sexism, ableism, racism, classism, heterosexism, religious discrimination) are connected and support one another.

Bisceglio's walk down Memory Lane was prompted by the arrival of a package in the mail. The parcel came from her oldest son, Ronald Bisceglio. Among the items packed were the photo of his mother along with two medals attached to ribbons-one gold, the other silver.

Bisceglio was confident when she and her partner completed their skate they would win. Her career at the rink preceded recorded musical sound tracks, so people glided to live music, she said.

"I was almost sure we'd won," Bisceglio said. "You can tell if you're there if you're going to won."

Bisceglio said she plans on giving the photo and her medals to her younger son, so her legacy continues.

Alcohol and tobacco advertising

Many students walk to and from school five days a week. What do they see from the sidewalk?

Executive
Director
Kate Nugent
ventured out
with students



from our after school program Above the Influence to walk from the school down Main Street to the circle, capturing photos along the way.

As students walked by several storefronts, they noticed advertisements for alcohol and tobacco products, including e-cigarettes. These ads, often provided by the industry, impact youth's perception of harm and decision making around addictive substances.

Winooski Partnership for Prevention wants to open up the conversation to community members and residents, to ask what level of advertisements and promotional materials for substances we want to see in our city.

Currently, the draft Master Plan for the City of Winooski states:

"The Winooski Partnership for



Prevention works on substance abuse prevention through education, policy and data sharing. As an example, they work to assist the community in reducing the amount of youth-targeted alcohol and tobacco messages and thus reduce youth consumption of these substances. There may be a role for the City, either through zoning regulations or liquor licensing, to help limit alcohol and tobacco advertising to youth."

We are excited to see this language in the Master Plan and we look forward to future conversations with the City on the issue of tobacco and alcohol advertising, with the goal of putting in place a citywide policy limiting the amount/location of advertising.

Research shows that youth more frequently exposed to tobacco promotion are 60% more likely to have tried smoking and 30% more likely to be susceptible to future smoking, according to the National Cancer Institute.

Limiting point-of-sale advertisements is a proven method to reducing youth substance use. Let's build healthy community together.

A student's perspective

Kiana Lee Hill, 5th grade, attends our Above the Influence program. Here are a few of her thoughts about e-cigarettes.

"When you use e-cigarettes, you can injure your brain... When you use a JUUL, it has the same amount of nicotine as 12 e-cigarettes... E-cigarettes can start a fire... Nicotine is toxic to developing fetuses."

"I wouldn't use e-cigarettes because when I have a dream [for my future], I want it to happen... and I don't think it will happen if I use e-cigarettes."

Vermont legislative update

We are excited to see momentum around the Tobacco 21 bill. National data show about 95 percent of adult smokers begin smoking before they turn 21.

By raising the legal purchasing age to 21, the bill is designed to reduce smoking

rates.

Research also shows that kids often turn to older friends and classmates as sources of cigarettes. Increasing the tobacco age to 21 would reduce the likelihood that a high school student will be able to legally purchase tobacco products for other students and underage friends.

Your support means that girls in your community learn what it takes to be an entrepreneur. They learn that success takes teamwork, planning, goal setting




