Three WHS Students Nominated for Vermont Presidential Scholarship

Our learning community celebrates three Winooski High School students who exemplify the value of a quality education. Hussein Amuri, Penny Ly, and Evelyn Monje have been nominated as Vermont Presidential Scholars. Each of these students demonstrate an unwavering commitment to their education and, most important, applying their education to benefit their community.

Each year, the Vermont Presidential Scholars Program recognizes students for academic success, artistic and technical excellence, community service, and leadership.

A selection of 25 Vermont Presidential Scholars will be invited by the U.S. Department of Education to apply for the U.S. Presidential Scholars Program, which recognizes some of the country's most distinguished high school seniors.

During the first week of May, the scholars are announced. 121 students are accepted as academic scholars. 20 students are chosen as art scholars, and 20 in career and technical education.

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Hussein Amuri has

first-hand experience in civic engagement at both the local and state level. He held an internship role in the political campaign for Gubernatorial candidate

Rebecca Holcomb, and has said that he is interested in becoming a political leader in Vermont some day.

Hussein is also a student representative on the City of Winooski's Charter Commission, which was formed to advise the City Council on potential changes to the Municipal Charter, the foundational governance document of the City of Winooski. The Charter Commission was charged with examining options to present Winooski voters with a charter change that would enable non-citizen residents to vote in Winooski municipal elections. The proposed change would allow more than 10% of Winooski's residents who are now barred from voting in local elections a chance to participate. The charter change was adopted by the citizens of Winooski on November 3, but the proposed charter change still has a number of steps before it becomes binding.

Hussein was a vocal supporter of this charter change. As a fairly recent immigrant to the city, the issue was personal for him. "I love Winooski because I've known it as a city where everyone is welcome," Hussein said. "I want us to be a welcoming city in how we are governed and how we elect people."

He went on, "It is an honor and a privilege to be nominated as a Presidential Scholar. I'm extremely proud and humble of everything that I've accomplished during my time here at Winooski. But as much as this



is my accomplishment, it is also the accomplishment of everyone who helped me get here. My teachers, the community members that I got the chance to meet under the Charter Commission, my friends, as well as the entire Winooski School District for its outstanding academic leadership with the profiencybased learning system that has done more than educate me. I feel I am prepared to be the change that I want see in the world."

Penny Ly is a natural leader in the classroom and in her community. Penny is a bright light and always leads by example. She has a very warm and



welcoming personality that puts everyone at ease. She is very mature and is well respected by adults and her peers. Penny is a very hard worker who is focused on her future and engages, each day, in all the Vermont educational system has to offer.

Penny is this year's WHS UVM Green and Gold Scholar, which indicates that she is the top student in her class. Currently, she is enrolled in Burlington Technical Center's Health Sciences Academy program. Students in this program have the opportunity to choose one of two levels of rigor: a more rigorous honors level or a less rigorous standard level. Students choose the level they wish to participate in and, as such, have different opportunities to earn dual enrollment credit. Penny chose to take our entire program at the honors level and will finish our program with 17 dual enrollment credits which is the maximum number we offer. These courses include VTC Anatomy & Physiology I and II, Human Growth and Development,

Introduction to Nutrition and CCV Medical Terminology. What is remarkable is the fact that Penny has maintained an A average in Health Sciences Academy as well as all of her dual enrollment classes!

Evelyn Monje is a selfmotivated and self-directed youth. Evelyn not only takes full advantage of everything our educational system has to offer, but seeks opportunities that



will address her passions as a leader

and activist. Evelyn is a talented, compassionate, creative thinker, as well as a strong communicator.

Evelyn exudes a strong passion for educational equity and has played a critical role in leading the work of the Winooski Students for Antiracism (WSA). In doing so, she has supported the Winooski School District School Board in understanding what is needed to become an anti-racist school district. She is now co-facilitating a portion of each monthly School Board meeting to ensure that the Board continues to center anti-racism and youth-adult partnership in their work.

According to Lindsey Halman, Executive Director *UP for Learning* "Eveyln's leadership role has been exemplary and critically important to the work of *UP for Learning* in ensuring that we are truly living our mission of empowering youth and adults to reimagine and transform education together."

Happy New Year!

Dear Winooski families, I wish all of you a Happy New Year filled with health and prosperity! These past ten months of pandemic has challenged our community in ways we never imagined and we have responded with incredible care and perseverance. As I compose this message there is an outbreak at Our Lady of Providence and forty positive cases in our WSD learning community. Thanks to our tireless and professional School Nurses/COVID-19 Coordinators Liz Parris and Katharine Monje for their leadership during this hectic time.

WSD had a great run of in-person instruction from September 8th through December 9th without a single positive case. This was in large part due to the thoughtful work of our staff in constructing and teaching mitigation strategies and learning models, the amazing support of parents/ guardians who have supported all the health precautions and the in-person and virtual learning models and our magnificent students who have shown tremendous adaptability.

During all of this uncertainty WSD has managed to keep our focus on three significant priorities in addition to the daily operations of the school district:

1. Capital Project: After six months the new middle school, additional elementary pods, new gym and maintenance shed are enclosed and awaiting windows. The road around the building is fully cut and all underground

utilities are safely buried. ReArch will be working inside

the new additions during the winter. We are completing our moving plans for March 2021-June 2022 with the goal of impacting our youngest students the least. We have two minor moves in March and April 2021 and the bulk of the office and classroom moves will be during the 2021-22 school year.

2. Antiracism: Deep, sustainable learning is always messy and antiracism work is about as complicated and important as learning can be! WSD is forging ahead as thoughtfully and inclusively as possible so we can create equitable and antiracist systems, policies and experiences. The school board has asked a Planning Team to build an inclusive Antiracism Steering Committee and Demand-Based Teams to dig into this important work. Also, the board is considering a proposed budget from Winooski Students Against Antiracism (WSA) to support the work. 3. FY22 Budget: The school board has held four budget meetings so far, will meet Wednesday, January 6th, and are slated to adopt a budget on January 13th. All FY22 budget materials can be found here: https://www.wsdvt.org/ school-board/budget/

Of the \$1million or 5% year-to-year increase, \$500K is to support the Capital Project through debt service, \$370K is salaries and benefits increases and the remainder is primarily due to special education tuition. We are doing our very best to contain expenses as we navigate a challenging budget cycle due to Vermont COVID-19 related revenue shortfalls.

Lastly, please continue to take care of yourself and everyone in Winooski by following social distancing precautions, avoiding leisure travel and multi-family gatherings, wearing masks when you go out, washing and sanitizing your hands frequently, contacting your doctor if you are sick, and staying positive!

We will get through this together and be stronger because of it! Thank you for working with WSD to benefit our students!

School Board Update

These students were selected because of their outstanding leadership and service to our community. I have no doubt that we will see many more Presidential Scholars from our district because our teachers and curriculum empowers students to be leaders.

RESTORATIVE JUSTICE IN THE WINOOSKI SCHOOL DISTRICT

School Staff Reflect on the Benefits of Being a Circle Keeper

A fundamental part of professional learning for restorative justice is providing staff members opportunities to experience and become comfortable with restorative justice circles. We've been offering voluntary district-wide weekly restorative justice circles for staff. Through this approach, staff are able to become more familiar with how circles operate before they're faced with facilitating one for students. Staff are given the option of being a participant or circle keeper. A circle keeper facilitates and poses questions for everyone in the circle to respond to. They're responsible for maintaining the space and ensuring the mutually agreed upon circle agreements are adhered to. A circle keeper plays multiple roles, not only do they hold the role of facilitator, but they're also a participant too. Circle keepers meet with the Restorative Justice Coordinator to review the circle script and discuss their experiences.

The WSD Wellness Coordinator Jaycie Puttlitz, described her experience as a circle keeper: "Our circle topics often tackle issues that can be hard for people to discuss. Sometimes the topic is deeply thought-provoking, sometimes it evokes an emotional response. What I have found, is that the structure and respect at the foundation of the circle gives everyone in it an equal voice. Participants can safely voice their thoughts without the fear of a negative response from others. I wanted to lead circles for our staff because I was curious if restorative practices could have a positive impact on staff wellness. These restorative practices have been particularly helpful for staff this year as they bear the stress and anxiety of working in a pandemic. Having a time and space to open up and connect with colleagues has been incredibly important to staff wellbeing. And, I believe that the more we practice these circles as a staff the better we will be able to support our students in becoming circle keepers in our classrooms and community."





Behavior Interventionist Mohamed Diop said: "Circle keeping has been a great experience holding space for our WSD staff and administrators to come together, listen to each other, share their authentic perspectives and learn from one another in trusted bubbles through prompts, or topics of discussion that are designed to connect us as employees, foster Restorative Justice, or practice approaches to treat and serve our students better in our school district."

ELL Teacher Jean Plasse said: "I'm really glad my coworkers encouraged me to be a circle keeper. It's really been a powerful way for me to connect with other people. I enjoy helping and this makes me feel like I'm helping in a powerful way. It's not just something else that I do; it's an important part of my Wednesdays. It makes me feel empowered, heard and helpful. I like making space for others and listening to what they have to say. It feels right. I also really appreciate the structure."

High School Math Teacher Luke Dorfman said: "Participating in the staff circles this year as a circle keeper has been a source of joy for me, especially in the midst of so much turbulence and stress that comes with teaching during a pandemic. Having a consistent time and space to connect with my colleagues — to hear about their experiences and emotions and to share my own — has helped me remain balanced and centered. I have valued the opportunity to facilitate these spaces as well, giving others a chance to find connection and community too. My skills as a facilitator have strengthened over time, and I have a growing understanding of and appreciation for the indigenous practices at the heart of circles. I look forward to continuing to learn and grow moving forward."

Free Meal Kits for Winooski Children

While the School District is fully remote, we are still committed to providing healthy meals for our students, and all children in Winooski. In order to better meet the needs of our families, our food service providers will be offering "make your own meal" kits so that students can make their own meals at home with the groceries provided through the district.

Every child in Winooski, aged 0-18, is eligible for one meal kit which has enough food for seven days for that child. The kits include breakfast and lunch. Meal kits typically include two pre-made meals, as well as bread, milk, meat, cheese, vegetables, fruit, and other staples.



These meal kits will be available for pick-up at the dates listed below from 9-10 am at three locations:

- 1. Winooski School District 60 Normand Street
- 2. Winooski Family Center 87 Elm Street
- 3. O'Brien Community Center 32 Malletts Bay Avenue

If WSD goes back to the previous in-person learning schedule, meal kits will include enough food for five days, rather than seven.



Meal Kit distribution dates:

- January 6
- January 13
- January 20
- January 27

If your family is experiencing extenuating circumstances (due to quarantine or health issues, for example) please contact your child's teacher or guidance counselor to arrange for home delivery. Due to staffing issues, families must request meal delivery every week and delivery is not guaranteed.

First Foundation Dedicated to Winooski Schools Celebrates \$100,000 Gift

Donor Hails the Capital Project a "Vision of Equity"

December 4, 2020, Winooski, VT - The Heart of Winooski (HOW) Foundation is pleased to announce that it has secured a lead gift from Shelburne residents, Bruce Lisman and Kyla Sternlieb.

"In recent years, we've mostly focused our gifts on rescuing dogs and planting trees, but when we heard what was happening in

Winooski I knew that we needed to be a part of it," said Bruce Lisman. Kyla Sternlieb owns Under the Weather, a Winooskibased company that produces wellness products for dogs and cats.

Mr. Lisman visited the district several years ago and was struck by how crowded the classrooms were, but also how critical the role of the school is in the lives of all community members not just the students. More recently, after a virtual tour of the Capital Project design, he saw the project as forward-thinking, innovative, and really designed to meet the entire community's needs. He said, "This initiative is way past a remodeling of Winooski's schools. This is a comprehensive action-oriented effort to change the course of generations of children!"

"Superintendent McMannon presented his vision for the future of the school system and his passion is contagious. The schools in Winooski are places where children will have access to medical, dental, and psychological care in a private setting, in addition to a terrific education fitted to the needs of a highly diverse population," said Lisman. "Community members can access free, healthy food, and parents can receive culturally appropriate support so they can get the skills they need to engage in a modern educational system. In order to build on a vision of equity, they need new space...a lot of it."

"The Winooski Capital Project is an action step that aims to solve the problems of inequity. After all, 37% of the students are English Language Learners and Winooski has among the

highest poverty levels of all cities in Vermont," said Lisman. "The proof will be in the opportunities that are created for each student. They will go on to do great things long after I'm gone. We've chosen to make public our commitment in order to highlight both an extraordinary vision for one of Vermont's most diverse schools

but to remind others that this effort will require the help of many."

The HOW Foundation was established to support the ENDS statement of the Winooski School District, specifically as it pertains to the ongoing Capital Project. "I am incredibly grateful and humbled by Kyla and Bruce's generous investment in our project! Our hope is that others will be motivated to join them in this human-centered, community-driven effort to support innovative, personalized and supportive learning for all students and provide a hub of learning, connection and essential support for all Winooski residents," said Sean McMannon, WSD Superintendent.

The HOW Foundation Board, composed of 12 members, including two students, WSD staff members, a PTO member, a Winooski City Council member and Winooski community members, will work together on an investment plan for this and other donations.

The Capital Project, slated for completion in August 2022, will create approximately 75,000 sq ft of new space including a new gymnasium, middle school, and elementary school wing, as well as the renovation of approximately 125,000 sq ft of existing space. The new design reflects the modern advancement of the educational sector, incorporating a pod design rather than lecture structure, a full health office suite including a schoolbased health center, a large performing arts center and cafeteria. Municipal Update January 2021

Municipal Services

The City of Winooski is following up-to-date guidance from the CDC and the State of Vermont to continue to provide municipal services during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Winooski City Hall is open to the public, M–F, 9am - 3pm where:

- members of the public are required to wear a mask or face-covering - masks are available for those without them
- stanchions, dividers, and standing points are installed to facilitate a socially distanced line that may be extended outdoors if needed
- a log of all individuals will be maintained by the City Clerk's Office
- the land records vault is only open by appointment call 802 655 6410 to schedule
- a maximum of two individuals will be allowed in the vault at a time
- no more than 10 staff will be present at any time
- phones are answered at City Hall between 7:30 and 4:30

Wear a Mask or Face Covering in Winooski



Governor Phil Scott's Statewide mask mandate remains in effect. The mandate requires all Vermonters to wear masks or cloth facial coverings any time it is not possible to maintain a physical distance of at least six feet with others from outside their household. Those who are not required to use masks include those exercising outdoors, those under the age of 2, those with a medical or developmental condition that is complicated by a facial covering and those with difficulty breathing. Businesses and other entities may require customers to wear masks, including signage explaining mask requirements and denial of entry or service to those who decline to wear masks.

In response to the profound impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Winooski business community, the City of Winooski has adapted the Winooski Small Business Loan (WSBL) Program to provide businesses with emergency loans to assist them in bridging this difficult time. The new Tier 4 COVID-19 Relief Loan through the Winooski Small Business Loan Program offers businesses a 0% interest rate for the first 24 months of the loan term through a City interest rate buy-down and defers the principal payments for the first four months of the loan. This proposed loan structure will allow businesses leeway while they remain under mandatory closure orders and is serviced by Opportunities Credit Union. The Health Department recommends testing as soon as possible when:

- you have symptoms of COVID-19
- you are referred by your health care provider
- a person in your workplace or household, or a person you attended an event with, tests positive for COVID-19
- you plan on going to a social gathering with people you don't live with (other than recreating with one masked person outside).

You should get tested before the gathering, right after, and again on day 7. If you often gather socially with people you don't live with, you should get tested weekly. College students returning to Vermont from out of state should quarantine and be tested on or after day 7 of quarantine after returning home. Travelers to Vermont and Vermonters returning from out of state must follow quarantine requirements. You have the option to get a test on or after day 7 of quarantine and end your quarantine early with a negative test result.

Testing is provided at no cost. When you register you will be asked for insurance information – but, insurance is not required for testing, and you will not receive a bill or be charged a copay. The Health Department encourages people to provide their insurance information when registering. Because the companies can be reimbursed for their charges, it offsets some costs to the state, allowing the Vermont Department of Health to continue offering widespread testing.

Mayor's Update

Every January, city leadership is focused on the annual budget process. We're in the thick of planning the budget for the fiscal year 2022 (FY22) and there is still time to have your voices heard during this important decisionmaking process. FY22 budget meetings coincide with our remote City Council meetings and can be attended by computer or phone via Zoom. For full meeting information, presentations, and participation instructions, please visit *winooskvt.gov/fy22*.

We've held a few of these meetings by now - our proposed city budget maintains current services without any big new asks and a modest tax rate increase (less than the cost of living or about \$47 more per year for the average homeowner in Winooski). As always, you'll vote on the final budget on Town Meeting Day. We usually provide an in-person community dinner and hold a joint budget presentation at the Winooski School District before Town Meeting Day, but this year we'll be meeting virtually. Even so, I'm hopeful that everyone will be just as engaged and join us! Feel free to reach out to me with any questions you have ahead of the final vote.

Speaking of Town Meeting Day, I'd like to remind folks that while voters did approve the charter change to allow all -resident voting back in November, that change still requires approval by the state legislature and the process is still ongoing. US citizenship will be required to vote in Winooski during the 2021 Town Meeting Day - you can learn more about the charter change/all-resident voting process at *winooskivt.gov/charter*.

While our next city budget doesn't include any new asks, it does include some exciting new work. Winooski was recently awarded a \$300,000 grant to support equity in our city, as part of the Working Communities Challenge, a program designed to advance local collaborative efforts that build strong, healthy economies and communities in northern New England. Winooski will use this 3-year resource to establish systems to lift underrepresented voices and involve the area's diverse population in decision-making and community dialogue. We are partnering with the Winooski School District, US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants, AALV, and the Winooski Housing Authority on this important work.

I hope everyone was able to enjoy the holiday season in some manner this year, even though we couldn't gather or travel. While it has been tough to live in this pandemic, I am so thankful for our welcoming and caring community; thank you for continuing to wear your masks, socially distance, and follow the Health Department's guidance. We are a strong and resilient community, dedicated to supporting each other.

2021 Winter Parking Ban Reminder



Winter is here, and overnight street parking is prohibited during winter parking bans in Winooski. To receive up-to-date winter parking ban alerts, text 'Winooski' to 888-777 or register at *nixle. com*.

Overnight street parking is prohibited in Downtown Winooski from 2:30am to 6am (December 1st to March 31st). For the rest of the City, winter parking bans are made on a case-by-case, weatherdependent basis or for area-specific snow removal where overnight street parking is prohibited from 11pm to 7am.

- When issued, bans may last more than one evening and are in effect until further notice
- The City of Winooski reserves the right to tow vehicles at the owner's expense

Winooski Receives Working Communities Challenge Grant



Winooski received a three-year, \$300,000 grant to implement an initiative which will focus on engaging the full diversity of the Winooski community in critical decision-making. Winooski is the most diverse municipality in northern New England and the only majorityminority school district in Vermont. The initiative aims to establish systems that lift underrepresented voices and accurately reflect the area's demographics. Census data demonstrates that 31% of Winooski residents live below the poverty threshold. Many of these at-risk individuals are new Americans and face very real language, cultural, and trust barriers to

participating in community dialogue. Without intervention, more than onefifth of the low-income community will have no voice in the decision-making processes that directly impact them.

The grant will allow Winooski to:

- Establish an Equity Commission geared towards making sure diverse voices are included in community decision-making processes.
- Expand the existing Community Cultural Liaison roles to build and strengthen partnerships between the city, school district, businesses, and community organizations.
- Hire a city Equity Director who would lead these changes and anti-racism work.
- Enhance the city's commitment to inclusion.
- Ensure that the strategic advantages diversity brings are accompanied by a future in which all voices are heard in decision-making and represented in the seats of power.
- Be a model for the future communities of Vermont.

About the Working Communities Challenge - The Working Communities Challenge advances local collaborative efforts that build strong, healthy economies and communities in Vermont's rural towns, regions, and smaller cities. Launched in 2019, the initiative supports diverse, local teams as they tackle complex challenges facing their communities. This unique three-year grant competition focuses on economic opportunity for communities and residents with low incomes. It's supported by the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, the State of Vermont, national and local philanthropy, and private sector employers.

Winooski Receives Youth Council Grant



The City of Winooski's Community Services Department is pleased to announce that they were awarded a grant through the Vermont Afterschool, Inc. Youth Council Grant program to support the creation of Winooski's own Youth Council.

Grant funds will allow our team to develop and sustain a Youth Council that will provide on-going leadership and help create an expanded slate of programs that will be relevant and accessible for our young people. Members will also be tasked with developing a participatory budgeting process by which they will sub-grant between \$2,000 and \$5,000 out to community-driven projects that will enhance or add youth programming options to our community. 


Flu season is in full swing so if you haven't already, please call your family doctor to discuss getting flu shots!

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Students Connect with Radio and Netflix Celebrity

On Wednesday, December 16th, Winooski students met with Latif Nasser, co-host of the award-winning podcast Radiolab, and host and executive producer of the Netflix science documentary series, *Connected*. After connecting and coordinating with Latif via Twitter, Luke Dorfman (HS teacher) organized a time for students to talk with him over Zoom, creating space for students to learn more about his life and journey as a storyteller and reporter as well as an opportunity to ask him questions of their own.

Students' questions ranged from how he earns listeners' trust, to lead and environmental justice, to using storytelling to increase cultural understanding, and how it feels breaking barriers in his field as a person from a historically underrepresented group. Latif answered students' questions, offered to connect some with experts for further research, and urged them all: "You should all take on the world because you can...and you should. We need you!" Latif expressed his appreciation for the students and their thoughtful questions and offered to continue the conversation in the near future.
