Welcome, 2023!

In so many ways, I am grateful for the invitation this new year extends. This is the right time for me to pause, reflect on the past year, reorient myself to the things that truly matter in my life, and be gracious to myself, acknowledging that I've done my best.

I recently stepped down as Board President to share and make space for new board leadership. Stepping up as Board President in the tumultuous times of August 2020, I recognized an unmet need for a thoughtful, onboarding, succession plan for board leadership. I shepherded the inaugural creation of a Vice Chair role for the WSD board. The board's skillful and dedicated colleague, Allison Burlock, was elected by the board as Vice Chair in July. For four months, Allison and I worked towards a seamless leadership transition. Kamal Dahal is now WSD's Vice Chair and these two strong leaders will serve our school and community admirably.

Another inaugural shepherding to enhance transparent leadership was creating formal board committees. In a collaborative effort, committees were formalized with a clear purpose, reporting, and limitations on authority. The meetings are announced to invite the public and meeting notes are published to inform the public.

The Superintendent Evaluation Committee (SEC) is one of the board's new committees. Evaluating the superintendent is an essential job for the board and having a formal committee to do this work was new and necessary. Policy Governance uses a primary method for evaluation which is a year-long policy monitoring process based on the policies the superintendent is responsible for upholding, evidenced by data. This is an important measurement. And, there are other elements worthy of measuring. To that end, the committee recommended to the board use the service of the VSBA's Evaluation process that added more elements beyond just policy. The evaluation also included Board/Superintendent Relationships, Business/Finance, Community Relations, Faculty & Staff Relationships, and Instructional Leadership. The board learned from this



process and will expand future evaluations to be more inclusive of the broad range of measures, including climate/culture and stakeholder input. Feedback is vital to healthy leadership.

The SEC has now repurposed itself as the Superintendent Search Committee. The committee will meet each Wednesday prior to the budget/board meetings. Once the board determines a national search consultant to lead us through the process, there'll be space for stakeholders to join in on focus groups to voice their vision for the district and the type of leader that would best serve our youth, families, and community. The search for WSD's next superintendent is pivotal for our collective future at WSD.

For a number of years, WSD has been remodeling learning, building systems, and structures to honor and engage every student as they build the needed skills and knowledges to graduate ready for college, career, and citizenship. And yet, the City-School Equity Audit pointed out that the work has not changed the systemic, inequitable, and predictable realities of which students will be more disciplined, less proficient, or not feel they belong based on race, poverty, and disabilities. Involving all voices at the table all along the way is the only way to true equity. The current mechanism that holds promise and inspiration is the Antiracism Steering Committee and Action Teams based on the student demands in 2020. There are students, community members, community partners, teachers, and administrators working toward equity and justice. Join the collaborative spirited teams to help create better conditions for each and every student. We have a whole new year ahead of us to collectively disrupt persistent inequities for Winooski's youth and families.

A Journey to Bus Transportation

A heartfelt thank you to all the community members and parents who stepped up to make sure bus transportation is an option for students attending the Winooski School District.

Several years ago, it was brought to the school board's attention that bus transportation was desired by, and necessary to many WSD families to ensure students arrived on campus dry, warm, and on time. After several attempts to answer this plea, including offering winter transportation, and partnering with Green Mountain Transit's public buses, the need to do something different became clear.

WSD leaders and community members came together with

the common goal, to ensure stable year-round transportation to and from school for WSD students living .75 miles or further from campus. While the end goal was straightforward, the path to getting there was not.

A national shortage of bus drivers was the biggest hurdle. Mountain Transit, the contracted bus provider, did not have enough drivers to implement our routes. So Winooski got creative. An invitation was made to community members, specifically parents, to step forward and drive the bus. And the response was overwhelmingly positive.

Over the 2022 summer and fall, WSD alongside the Department of Motor

Vehicles, and Mountain Transit supported candidates in studying for and taking the 5 required written permit tests, attending the



school bus clinic, completing 50+ hours of driving training, and taking the final driving test. We are so grateful for the collaboration of these groups.

These efforts resulted in enough trained and licensed drivers for Winooski to kick off limited bus transportation in December with plans for expanding routes in the new year.

This service is a game changer for many Winooski families and students and something we are proud to be able to offer. We are grateful for the drivers and driver

candidates who took the initiative to get licensed, it is not an easy process, you are the superheroes in this story!

From the SRO Desk

Along with the new school entrance and bus transportation, WSD also adopted new Drop-Off and Pick-Up procedures. The innermost driveway loop is now open and used for DRIVE THRU DROP-OFF only in the morning. Drivers in this loop should NOT exit their vehicles to assist students out of the vehicle, this ensures a continuous flow of traffic.



Morning drop off:

There are 2 lanes in the loop closest to the school. The inner lane (closest to the school) is used for buses. The outer lane is for parents and guardians dropping off students. Vehicles should pull all the way forward and drop off when by the front entrance. Drivers should remain in their vehicles.

If you must exit your vehicle to assist your child, we ask that you park in the second loop or main lot, in a designated parking space to then assist your child into the school or to meet preschool.



George St is not a student drop-off or pick-up location.

There is no one there to offer supervision at the beginning of the day or at the end of the day. That parking lot is for **staff parking only**.

Afternoon / End of the day pick up:

JFK staff are no longer offering car-rider pickup in the second loop. We encourage students to ride the bus or walk home from school. If they need to be picked up, please park in a designated parking space and walk to the front to meet with classroom staff.

Please do not block or obstruct the driveway, as this is used so buses can access the front of the school or more importantly emergency vehicles.

Professional Development for WSD Teachers and Staff

Over the past couple of years, the Winooski School District took a critical look at our core programs and curriculum. We found that many of our elementary students were not meeting grade-level expectations in reading and math. On top of this, our exploration also revealed that our students and community desired a more transparent report card and transcript for students in grades 6-12.

Upon learning these things, WSD educators came together to find solutions to these issues, with the goal of providing the highest level of academic instruction and assessment possible. The following changes were made:

At the beginning of the 2022-2023 school year, WSD introduced and implemented new core programs in grades K-8: Expeditionary Learning, a knowledge-based program, Illustrative Math, which focuses on problem-solving and critical thinking, and Open Up Math which also focuses on problem-solving and critical thinking. All three are top-rated programs with proven records of student success. Since introducing these programs, WSD leadership staff have made it a habit to do monthly walk-throughs of classrooms to check in on student and staff progress. What they have seen is that while students are engaging with the material and making strides towards benchmarks, staff are needing more time to prepare and learn the new curriculum.

In addition to these new curriculum programs, WSD has also taken steps at WMHS to address student and family concerns, including implementing completely revised grading and reporting systems.

All of these changes have required our teachers to learn new ways to teach and assess students. This year we have squeezed this learning and planning into our regularly scheduled inservice times, which are already full. We have learned that in order to properly implement these new and exciting changes, our teachers and staff will need more time for learning in order to best serve your children.

This brings us to where we are now. We need more time for our K-8 teachers to more deeply understand the new curriculums. We need time for our middle and high school teachers to work together on the revised proficiency model. And we need more time for teams to plan how they will provide additional support to students who need them.

Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, we are proposing an adjustment to the current school schedule in order to allow an extra hour per week for teachers and staff to prepare. To do this we will either need to implement a weekly late start at 9:10am on Thursdays or a weekly early dismissal at 1:50pm on Thursdays.

We have heard parents' concerns about the inconvenience this will cause many, specifically involving childcare, and we want it to be known that addressing this concern is at the top of our priority list. We will not move forward until a solution is found.

Despite taking classroom time away from students, this adapted schedule will be beneficial to student learning as it will ensure the highest level of academic instruction and assessment. Teachers teach best when they are prepared.

We are very excited about these changes and can't wait to see the long-lasting effects they have on our student's academic growth. Per the WSD end statement, we intend to have all students graduate from WSD college and career ready and we believe these changes will help bring this to fruition.





Antiracism Work Update

The Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC) met on December 5th to discuss how to support the Action Groups and think of how to share its work with the community through events. Action Team leads were invited to join the meeting to share updates.

The Steering Committee also discussed the City of Winooski's budget which was presented the same night that the group was meeting. They talked about areas where the budget may or may not align with the committee's values and specifically how the City not having an Equity Director or Youth Interventionist might impact some of the committee's goals.

Here are updates from the Action Demand Groups:

- 1. Truth and Reconciliation Commission: They are thinking about how to prepare the community for Restorative Justice for Oakland Youth (RJOY)'s visit to Winooski. They want to plan events with art and food that will educate and allow the community to reflect on their experiences.
- 2. Hiring and Retaining Teachers of Color: The ARSC hasn't received updates from this group. A few members will follow up and also connect interested people and potential helpful contacts with this group.
- 3. Ethnic Studies: They are working on a framework to define Ethnic Studies using UCLA's Ethnic Studies guidelines as well as the Social Justice Standards. They are also hoping to find more ways to get the community involved in the vision for Ethnic Studies.
- 4. Equity Review: This group is planning to revisit the equity audit to identify the highlights and actionable items. They are planning on creating an accessible one-page document that shows the highlights of the equity audit. They are also planning to connect with the group that is focusing on addressing the results of the equity audit from the City's perspective.





- 5. Civil Rights Workshops: The ARSC hasn't received updates from this group. A few members will follow up with the group.
- **6. Multilingual Learner Mentorship:** They have continued to stay in contact with Mentor Vermont who offered them a grant to start the program with the promise that the school would be able to fund the program to continue.

McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act

The McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act ensures educational rights and protections for children and youth experiencing homelessness. This legislation requires that all homeless children and youth have the same access to a free, appropriate public education as other children and youth in Vermont.

The goals of this legislation include:

- · Identifying homeless children and youth
- Immediate enrollment and facilitation of enrollment disputes
- Ensuring access to school and appropriate educational services
- Reducing school transfers and supporting educational stability and continuity
- Increasing parental choice and involvement regarding school enrollment
- Ensuring the educational rights of an unaccompanied youth, and
- Providing information about the rights of homeless children and youth

Eligible children have the right to:

- Receive a free, appropriate education
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is the preference.

If the school system believes that the school selected is not in the best interest of the children, then the school system must provide a written explanation of its position and inform families of the right to appeal its decision.

- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if requested.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to children's needs.





Letter from the Mayor

Hello Neighbors. I hope you've been enjoying a mild winter and festive holiday season. Kudos to Downtown Winooski and our local businesses for another successful



Holiday Pop Up shopping event. January brings a new year with new hopes. It also means that City Council and staff are well into the annual budget planning process, deciding what we should present to voters on the Town Meeting Day Ballot. Like many of you are experiencing, this budget is also seeing a significant impact from inflation and increasing costs. There are three ways to retain our current level of services and meet some existing commitments:

- Increase the tax rate to 14.53%
- Increase the tax rate, but cut positions and services to lower the number to 11.62%
- Proposed: Increase the tax rate, but cut positions and services to lower the number to 11.62%, then use reserve funds to lower even further to 5%

In the proposed budget, using reserve funds would include a big portion of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) federal grant money we've received to address COVID impacts. In FY25, we would then expect to cover this amount with and using some of the soon-to-be-available funds than available from paying off the Tax Increment Financing (TIF) loan (from redeveloping the downtown in the 2000s). The City Council will make final decisions at upcoming meetings which you can attend, in person, by phone, online with Zoom, or just reach out and share your thoughts:

 Jan 23: Final Budget Vote/ Approval - Winooski City Council will approve the City budget for the ballot in March.

After the budget is finalized and voted on, we will join School Leadership to host public presentations for all residents to learn more, ask questions, and feel informed about how their tax dollars are used and what the City provides with those funds. For full budget info, please visit winooskivt.gov/fy24.

As a reminder, all legal residents of Winooski may vote on our local ballot items on Town Meeting Day, regardless of citizenship status. Legal voters may also consider running for City Council, as two seats are up for election every year - if you are interested in running, you can pick up a petition to collect 30 signatures and get your name on the ballot. Petitions are due back to City Hall Monday, January 30, 2023. If you're interested in serving the community, have an interest in local government, or feel your perspective is not represented right now, please consider running. I am happy to speak with anyone and share about the role and time commitment.

Happy holidays, neighbors! As we enter a new calendar year and the start of the legislative session, I want to share a broad overview of what we will be working on in Montpelier, and how you can stay involved and informed. Rep. Small and I are very united in our

appreciation for the unique needs of our community, as well as the importance of collaboration and connection throughout this upcoming term.

Legislators have been caucusing the past month to set policy agendas for the upcoming biennium, or two-year term. We meet in our major party caucuses as well as special focus groups, and discuss policy solutions to issues we hear from our constituents. The details are being drafted at this moment, so expect to see more in the first weeks of the session as the bills are introduced and assigned to a committee. You can watch on YouTube or in person at the State House, and I will include information about that on my website on the Get Involved tab.

It won't surprise anyone that housing is a clear priority across every district in the state. I will be working with my new colleagues to address affordability and availability of housing by looking at bills through a lens of whether they are equitable and inclusive of low income and diverse people, including multigenerational families.

A second priority that closely intersects with housing is child care. We know that affordable child care allows parents and guardians to find stable housing and contribute to the economy, and most importantly for children and communities to flourish.

Mental health and wellness have been a universal concern across Vermont and also a topic that came up across so many conversations here in Winooski. Mental health has been important to me personally and professionally, and I am already meeting with stakeholders to discuss where the levers are to meet the most critical needs for our community.

Please join upcoming monthly community conversations that Representative Small and I are hosting together, so that we can let you know the latest from Montpelier and also hear how we can support you and our neighbors. Our first conversation will be January 28 at the Community Center on Mallets Bay Ave. Watch our social media and websites for details. I look forward to working with you in 2023 and hope you have a safe and happy holiday season.

Economic Vitality

and looked into a special weatherization
program for Winooski residents.

Housing

On December 12th, Elaine Wang, City Manager, presented the City Council with the City's Housing goals update, which notes the progress on updating our Public Building Registry Ordinance, assisting the Housing Commission with policy work, and launching the Winooski Housing Trust Fund. Safe, Healthy, Connected People

On behalf of our community and the Winooski Fire Department, the City of Winooski thanks the Fire and Rescue Departments of St. Michael's College, Vermont Air National Guard, Burlington, South Burlington, Colchester, Essex, and Williston for supporting our response to the structure fire at 72 East Allen Street last month. The efforts of about 70 firefighters and rescue personnel ensured the safety of our residents and prevented the neighboring buildings from being damaged.

COVID-19 Information

As we head into the colder months, the City of Winooski encourages our residents and visitors to do everything they can to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Stay up to date on vaccinations.

Vaccines are the best tool we have to protect ourselves against COVID-19, especially from severe illness, hospitalization and death. Vermonters ages 6 months and older can get vaccinated, including with the new "bivalent" vaccines. Bivalent vaccines protect against older and newer strains circulating in Vermont. We strongly encourage you to protect yourself by getting vaccinated as soon as possible.

Stay home if sick.

Whether you have symptoms of COVID-19, the flu, or another contagious

illness, please stay home if you are sick and call your health care provider if needed. (If you don't have a health care provider, call 2-1-1.) This helps keep germs from spreading, protects those who may be at risk of serious illness, and gives you a chance to get well.

Continue to wear a mask in public.

While masking is no longer mandatory in Vermont, community members can still use this important preventative tool. Examples of high-quality masks are N95 or KN95 masks, which are very good at blocking the droplets from our breath that spreads the virus. You can also wear a well-fitting mask with at least two layers of tightly-woven fabric, or layer a disposable mask under a cloth mask to increase effectiveness.

Get tested when needed.

You can protect others by getting tested if you have COVID-19 symptoms or if you are a close contact of someone who tested positive for COVID-19, so you can decide whether to isolate. It's especially important to get tested if you are at higher risk for COVID-19, so you can reach out to your health care provider to ask about treatment. Free COVID tests are available at the Winooski Clerk's Office at 27 W Allen St., the Winooski Library at 32 Mallets Bay Ave, and the Winooski Senior Center at 123 Barlow St.

To license your dog, we will need a currently valid rabies certificate. Each dog owner will need to license the dog on or before April 3rd. On April 4th, an additional late fee will be applied.

Citywide Reappraisal

The City of Winooski was ordered by the State of Vermont to complete a citywide reappraisal. State law requires Vermont municipalities to reappraise all forms of property when the Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) falls below 85% or rises above 115%. The purpose of the citywide reappraisal is to ensure that every property taxpayer is paying their fair share of (but not more than) property taxes.

The city-wide reappraisal will be completed in phases during a two-year process.

- On June 15th, the City of Winooski began to send out letters (street by street) to property owners requesting information or inspection.
- On July 1, the City's contracted appraiser began field work which includes a market study that establishes preliminary valuation tables and schedules for the reappraisal.
- If you are a property owner, please keep an eye out for one of these letters as we make our way through each address.

The new values are set to begin on April 1st, 2024 for the 2024-25 budget and tax year.

Annual Winter Parking Ban Reminder

Overnight street parking is prohibited in downtown Winooski from 2:30am to 6pm (December 1st to March 31st). For the rest of the City, winter parking bans are made on a case-by-case, weather-dependent basis or for area-specific snow removal where overnight street parking is prohibited from 11pm to 7am.

- When issued, bans may last more than one evening and are in effect until further notice. The City of Winooski reserves the right to tow vehicles at the owner's expense.
- Landline users must retrieve their updates by calling the dedicated parking ban line at 802 655 3908.
- Winter parking ban signs (located on East Allen Street near the Exit 15 off-ramp and at the entrance to Winooski over the Burlington/ Winooski Bridge) will flash when a winter parking ban is in effect.
- Overnight parking in the Winooski Parking Garage on Cascade Way is available (pay at kiosk or by ParkMobile app) 6pm to 7am.

We are now back to our regular monthly schedule of the 2nd and 4th Wednesday afternoons and 2nd and 4th Saturday mornings of each month.

We have been fortunate to have been a recipient of the Diaper Bank in South Burlington. They were able to supply all the diapers our clients needed once Covid started and so many people were out of work! Unfortunately, they are no longer able to supply us with all the diapers our clients have requested. We will be limiting diapers and may be phasing them out. Any help or ideas would be appreciated! We have been supplying wipes and diapers to 250 babies just here in Winooski!

Thank you to everyone who had provided funds, food and toiletries to the Food Shelf in 2022. You are the reason we have been able to send food home to 1,300 people each month! Each family takes home a 2 to 3 day supply of food each time they come. Each family can come one Wednesday and two Saturdays each month.

We are asking for donations of cooking oil, dried beans, children's cereals, and condiments such as mayo, ketchup and mustard. Store bought packages of cookies are always appreciated.

Food Shelf Policy: Winooski residents coming for the first time should bring proof that they live in Winooski such as a utility bill or rental lease. Winooski residents may access the pantry staples one Wednesday each month. They may also come both Saturdays

to stock up on bread, pastry and some fresh fruits and veggies. Shaw's in Colchester and Winooski's own Commodities Natural Market help supply Saturday's food.

Where to find us: The Food Shelf is located in the United Methodist Church at 24 West Allen Street. We do not provide rides so please bring a wheeled cart or suitcase and some bags to lug your food home. The church phone number is 802-655-7371.

Cash donations needed: The Food Shelf is growing rapidly. More and more of the food must be purchased since donations of food items cannot meet demand. Checks can be mailed to: The Winooski Food Shelf, P.O. Box 53, Winooski, VT 05404. You may also donate at winooskifoodshelf.org.

How Homesharing Helps Eliminate Social Isolation

In the November issue of The Winooski Newsletter, Sister Pat wrote an outstanding piece on social isolation and loneliness. As she noted in the article, "Recent studies



indicate that one in three older people experience loneliness and that this seriously affects their physical and mental health."

Through 40 years of creating compatible matches, at HomeShare Vermont we have found that this is one the most important elements of homesharing.

In our most-recent annual Outcomes Survey, 80 percent of those sharing their homes say they feel less lonely. In addition, 73 percent feel happier and 45 percent say they feel healthier.

Homesharing allows seniors to age in place, provides people with disabilities to be more independent and finds or maintains affordable housing for individuals with low or moderate incomes. Homesharing also provides incredibly cost-effective housing, using existing housing stock.



Howard Center Supports Vermonters

Vermont consistently
has more suicides than
the national average.
Howard Center and
the Center for Health
and Learning are
collaborating to provide
Vermont businesses and
community members
with up-to-date
information on suicide
prevention.



Our goal is to give businesses a greater understanding of risk factors that lead to a suicide attempt so they can address those factors in their professional settings. This will include information on supporting people during the very difficult period after someone close to them dies unexpectedly or by suicide.

With funding from the Vermont Community Foundation, the two organizations are creating informational materials designed for use by employers to introduce suicide prevention messaging for employee manuals, orientations, and staff trainings.

Howard Center is leveraging its close ties with the business community to share



these resources and offer technical assistance around their use.

With funding from philanthropic partners, the Howard Center is also looking to hire a Suicide Prevention Coordinator. The new position will add capacity and help coordinate with other efforts in the community.

As a community, it is important to reach out if we notice signs that someone is struggling. Here are some of the options that can offer treatment and intervention—day or night:

Making it easier to talk about substance use

Most people have been affected by substance use in some way, and talking about it can help. How can we make it easier to talk about? One way may be to think about it in a new way. We can't really control how substances will affect us. They are like any other "disease vector," and just like with Covid-19, substances impact different folks differently. Substances like alcohol, tobacco, high-potency Cannabis, and Opioids all work chemically similarly in creating a reward response in the brain that triggers us to compulsively (against our will) use them, even after they have started causing problems for us socially, academically, and or professionally. Factors, such as how old we are when we first try them, impact how much a substance is likely to trigger an addiction. As a community and a prevention coalition, we are here to address those factors together to protect each other from acquiring this disease, and we know that we can do this when we do it together. Some ways are to remove some of the factors that lead to early substance use by making it less likely that we'll try a substance before age 21. Specifically, we can limit access (how many places substances are sold and how close to under-21-year-olds and those in recovery they are sold), promotion (marketing and advertising), increase the price (such as disallowing coupons from manufacturers that negate the sales tax), and regulating the product itself (like eliminating flavored tobacco, including menthol, products).
