Letter from the Mayor

Hello Neighbors. We are looking forward to Town Meeting Day 2023 on Tuesday, March 7! Voting will take place from 7am to 7pm at the Winooski Senior Center (123 Barlow



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St.). Early voting is also always an option. This is your chance to vote on local issues including the city and school budgets, city councilors, school board members, and this year, a charter change placed on the ballot by residents.

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Here are a few things to consider in preparation for Town Meeting Day:

City Budget - faced with high inflation over the past years, we're looking at a higher-than-average tax rate increase to keep up with salaries and benefits with some adjustments to service areas both up and down. If voters approve the budget, we'll move forward with these investments, and know that we'll have to raise a bit more next year for increasing costs, potentially impacting the availability of new revenue we anticipate receiving after we pay off the debt from rebuilding our downtown, also known as the Tax Increment Finance (TIF) district. If voters don't approve the budget, we'll have to propose a different budget and hold a special election in the future until we get something approved.

Just Cause Eviction Petition - as you may have heard, recently, a local organization called Rights and Democracy collected enough petition signatures from Winooski voters to add a charter change item to the 2023 Town Meeting Day Ballot. If approved by Winooski voters, it would allow charter change language related to tenant eviction protections (also known as Just Cause Eviction) to be advanced to the State Legislature and Governor for consideration (much like the charter change to approve All-Resident Voting). Another public hearing is planned for February 4th. All details and meeting info are available at *winooskivt.gov*.

For reference, City Council discussed this topic back in August but didn't move forward with a charter change on our own because doing so on such a short timeline wouldn't be operationally possible. Creating a new ordinance and hiring new staff with the skills and capacity to enforce eviction protection ordinances would take a long time to figure out. Instead, City Council decided to advocate on behalf of our residents to the State Legislature, as the State is positioned to handle all of the things that come with Just Cause Eviction policy (legal services, court procedures, ordinance enforcement, etc.) We chose to prioritize our local resources towards addressing housing quality issues through the ongoing work of our Housing Commission. Should this process get far enough to consider operational changes, we will have to make serious decisions about re-prioritizing resources and other staffing/budget impacts.

Open Seats: the ballot will include two City Council candidates, two Winooski School District Trustee candidates, and a Winooski School District Treasurer. I encourage you to get to know all of the candidates, attend any forums, and ask many questions before casting your vote.

Preparing for Town Meeting Day: As we always do, we'll be hosting informational events leading up to Town Meeting Day. If you haven't already, please sign up for our news updates at *winooskivt.gov* to receive up-to-date information delivered directly to your email! Keep an eye out for our joint meeting with the Winooski School District and for the annual meeting the night before the election.

For full budget, meeting, and election details, please visit *winooskivt.gov/ townmeeting*. And, there's always time to register to vote if you haven't yet - visit *winooskivt.gov/vote* for our voting and election resources. As a reminder, <u>all legal</u> <u>residents of Winooski may vote on our</u> <u>local ballot items</u> on Town Meeting Day, regardless of citizenship status.

2023-24 Vision-Driven, Learner Investment

"All students will graduate from the Winooski School District (WSD) college and career ready at a cost supported by a majority of the Winooski community. WSD students will lead healthy, productive and successful lives and engage with their local and global community. "

The WSD Ends Statement states the high expectations we have for our students. Over the past few months, the WSD administration worked with the Board of School Trustees to determine the proposed budgetary investment in our school for the upcoming year based on the WSD Ends Statement. Thanks to Board Chairwoman Allison Burlock, Vice Chairman Kamal Dahal, Clerk Alex Yin, and members Tori Cleiland and Steven Berbeco for their student-centered and forward-thinking approach to budget development. Also, it was wonderful to have the insights of budget buddies Moe Matte and Sarah Mell.

During this budget cycle, we presented to the board members a level services budget, grounded in priorities with data about enrollment, student demographics, staffing, and Special Education and Multilingual Learners (MLL) program information. The Board of Trustees has adopted a \$25.4 million dollar budget with an estimated 9.6% tax impact depending on your specific income and/ or house value. The overall tax impact has been lessened through the application of \$1.4 million dollars in fund balance which will bring the fund balance to the auditor-recommended 4% of the operating budget.

The significant variances in the proposed budget are:

- +\$1.7M in salaries and benefits, no new staff, a total increase tied to existing labor agreements, and rising healthcare costs
 +\$1.6M to begin paying off the 30-year note to support the
- capital project
- +\$400K for special education contracted services

We worked very hard to procure financing for our capital project through USDA with an incredibly low-interest rate of 2.25% which is a full 1.6% less than what we were modeling during the vote on the capital project. This is expected to save WSD taxpayers over \$18 million dollars over the life of the 30year bond. Also, it is estimated that if we had delayed the capital project until the summer of 2022 we would have paid double or over \$100 million dollars to complete the same project

This budget maintains current programs and staffing levels and includes funds to continue to support student transportation back and forth to school for the upcoming school year which has been a great success this year including a drastic increase in student attendance and a decrease in tardiness.

I think you will see that the Board of Trustees has constructed



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a thoughtful, vision-driven investment in Winooski children that continues to move us forward to meet the high expectations of our WSD Ends Statement! We are blessed with a diverse student

> population who also require a high level of support to meet our high standards. Our staff and leadership team clearly understand the strengths and challenges of our students and forge ahead with creativity, collaboration and compassion.

School Board Update

This will be my last newsletter update and I wanted to thank the Winooski Community for giving me the opportunity, honor, and privilege to serve on your school board. I want to share my gratitude for Superintendent Sean McMannon's service to the district. Thank you for being a great partner to the school board as we navigated the pandemic, managed the capital project, and advocated for changes to the education funding formula. I appreciated our collaborations but am more grateful for our friendship. Our school district will miss your leadership. Many thanks also to my fellow school board members (too many to name here) for allowing me to be me. Oh, what a ride it has been.

I will be honest here and tell you, I had no clue what I was doing when I first joined the school board. Yet the job became easier when I learned about our ends statement: "All students will graduate from the Winooski School District (WSD) college and career ready at a cost supported by a majority of the Winooski community. WSD students will lead healthy, productive, and successful lives and engage with their local and global community."

I loved our ends statement because it is based on the principle that our students are the future. Thus, when we entered into every budget season, my goal was to have a school budget that was fiscally responsible, where if we properly invested in our education system, we would ensure the long-term health of Winooski's community. In my mind, being fiscally responsible did not mean we worked to have zero percent tax increases but instead investments that had long-term returns (i.e., students who wanted to stay and ensure we had a vibrant community). This is why I thought it was important for us to do the capital project because reactive fixes often have higher costs with smaller return on investment (such as repairing the water mainlines after the 100-year pipe burst in 2019). Yet, I hope I was also critical enough to ensure we did not propose a budget that would cause flight or gentrification. Our community is richer with wisdom when multi-generational families can afford to stay in Winooski.

I recognize that for residents who do not have children in the school, you may not see the immediate benefits in investing in our schools. Whereas with the city budget, it is much easier to see the tangible impacts based on the services provided. Yet investment in schools and education should always be seen as a long-term investment in democracy. I am a firm believer that a democracy cannot survive without an educated populace. To divest from education is to move away from the fundamental values that this country was founded on.

Investment in schools is also an investment in our community. Constantly, I have heard in the news that our youth do not stay in the state when they become adults. Truthfully, I do not blame them for leaving especially if they feel that we did not care enough to invest in their education. It takes a community to raise a child, and there are benefits to doing such things. These children become our future doctors, plumbers, chefs, carpenters, dentists, teachers, mechanics, scientists, and even governors. Productive community members that make living in Winooski and Vermont great. I have a feeling that the divestment of education is the reason why it takes me a month before I can get a basic car tune-up (and do not get me going on scheduling a doctor's appointment).

The proposed school budget is \$25,447,670, a 20% increase from the previous year. This would equate to a 17.41 percent increase in the tax rate. I know this increase is hard for many people especially when the cost of living has increased at a higher rate than our income. This is why as a school board, we will be using \$1,467,376 of our reserve fund to reduce the tax rate to 9.66%.

Normally, I would not recommend using the reserve fund to reduce the tax rate, because it creates a bigger burden on future budgets. Next year, though, the new educational funding formula will supposedly be in place that will essentially provide Winooski more buying power with their taxes. For example, if the new education funding formula had been implemented this year our tax rate would have been reduced by 14% with the same proposed budget. This is why our board has tirelessly advocated for these changes, because we believed in education equity. We will continue to work with our legislators to ensure the state does not backtrack from the promise of equity for all Vermont students.

My moment of pride in being a school board member is that we learned as a community to advocate for ourselves. No longer were we satisfied with what we had, because we believed the Winooski community and its students deserved equity. Let us take a stand in passing this school budget so that Vermont knows that we will no longer tolerate the inequities that our students have faced for so long. Thank you again for allowing me to be your school board trustee for the past six years. I leave the school board full of Winooski Pride!

Professional Development for WSD Teachers and Staff

Introducing the WSD Necessity Store

What is a school, if not a community? A high-quality

education goes beyond the classroom and extends into all aspects of a student's life. What we know is that the security of basic resources is incredibly important to a student's success. So why not bring these resources to campus?

As part of a school project, students Bhumika Magar and Santu Kaldan, alongside the WSD Wellness Coordinator, and other school officials took initiative during the first days of the Capital Project to make their vision of having a hub for resources at WSD a reality. Magar and Kaldan toured schools with similar concepts, conducted research, and surveyed fellow students before solidifying their proposal; they called it the Necessity Store.

With plans for the Necessity Store included in the Capital Project, and a variety of grants from organizations such as The Vermont Foodbank and The Vermont Community Foundation, intended to stock and replenish the shelves, Magar and Kaldan's vision became a reality.

During the fall of 2022,

as work on the building came to a close, WSD Wellness Coordinator, Patrice Lumumba, dedicated much of his time to getting the Necessity Store up and running. With the help of student volunteers, he ordered supplies such as a refrigerator, shelving, and clothing racks. He stocked the shelves with food, hygiene products, clothing, and winter gear, both purchased and donated. And he turned the once-blank canvas of a room into a welcoming and inclusive space for students and the community.

Throughout the process, which was not without its hiccups, Lumumba made sure resources were still available to students in need. He connected over 200 students with winter items before the Necessity Store doors even officially opened.

When students and staff returned from winter break in





January of 2023, the Necessity Store officially opened its doors with regular hours. Since then the store has served over 20 students a day.

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During a visit to the Necessity Store in early January, I had the opportunity to speak with a group of high school students who regularly visit the Necessity Store. Their insight helped me grasp just how important the Necessity Store is to the community.

9th Grader, Mapenzi Selemani, talked about

how important the Necessity Store is for students whose families are not always able to buy items like winter clothing and food stating that "Parents are really thankful."

In addition to providing items that students can take home, the store also has a variety of snacks students can choose from throughout the day "When you are hungry and it is not time for lunch yet or after lunch, you can just come here and grab snacks" said 10th grader Mamy Kyungu.

11th grader Nadine Ikizakubuntu, sang praise for

the Necessity Store exclaiming that "It makes me want to come to school every day." Ikizakubuntu hopes that the store will continue for years to come so that "students like my siblings who are in like elementary have the same experience that I have."

Staff and students involved with the Necessity Store hope to see it continue to grow and transform to best fit the needs of the unique Winooski community. One thing at the top of the list is a wider variety of foods from different cultures.

I hope this letter finds you all well and enjoying the beginning of an amazing new year! 2022 has come and gone and we've seen some amazing changes around the Winooski School District Campus. With the entire campus open and finishing touches (punch list) being completed it is SO EXCITING. With



one of my primary focuses being safety for the entire campus, I want to take some time to share some of our procedures.

Visitors: Any visitor coming onto the campus must enter through the main entrance. Once there, they will sign in at the front desk and obtain a visitors badge. The badge must be worn in a way that is easily seen by staff and students. When the visitor leaves, they will sign out at the front desk. Our campus encourages any student or staff to report anyone they do not recognize or is not wearing a badge to the proper administrator or SRO to maintain a safe campus for everyone.

Morning Drop Off: The drop off loop closest to the school is meant for parents or guardians that are literally dropping off students. The lane is divided into 2 parts. The lane closest to the school is for BUSSES ONLY. The left lane is for vehicle traffic. If you have to walk your child into school we ask you to use the second loop, which can be used to drop off or to park in a designated parking spot and then walk your student into the school.

If your child is or will be 3 by September 1st, 2023 please complete a **Preschool Skills Screening & Pre-registration Form** for ACT 166 Publicly Funded Pre-K or to inquire about a Winooski Preschool Program and attend our preschool skills screening day. If you have concerns about your child's development, our Winooski Early Childhood team will screen your child's development. This screening is play-based and free for 3 and 4-year-old children living in Winooski.

Winooski Preschool Programs: Preschool Skills Screening & Pre-registration Form

Winooski Early Childhood Program (at JFK):

The Winooski Early Childhood Program (WECP) is located at JFK Elementary school and collaborates with Head Start. There are two-morning sessions from 8am to 11am, and two-afternoon sessions from 11:30am to 3pm. Children attend 2, 3, or 4 days per week. Children participating in the Head Start program attend all 4 days and must also

Head Start Early Learning Center (at the Family Center)

The Early Learning Center (ELC) is a Head Start program that collaborates with the Winooski School District. The program is located at 87 Elm Street from 8:30am to 2:30pm where children attend Monday – Friday. To participate in the Head Start program you must also complete the Head

ACT 166 Publicly Funded Prekindergarten for children between the ages of 3 and 5 who reside in the town of Winooski, Vermont

Preschool Skills Screening & ACT 166 Pre-registration Form

New and returning families must complete a new pre-registration form EACH year to participate.

What is publicly funded prekindergarten education?

Publicly funded prekindergarten education is defined as:

• Ten hours per week for 35 weeks in a community private early care and education programs. These pre-approved programs meet specific quality standards and provide developmentally appropriate learning experiences that are based on Vermont's Early Learning Standards. Prekindergarten education is limited to the academic year (September 2023 – June 2024).

Are these 10 hours/week pre-kindergarten programs tuition-free?

The pre-kindergarten program offered in public school is tuition-free. The pre-kindergarten program offered through a partner program will charge families for the care and education program the child needs beyond the 10 hours/week during the academic year. Your child's preschool must deduct these public funds from your annual tuition bill.

Is my child eligible for publicly funded prekindergarten?

If your child is 3 years old by September 1, 2023, and resides in Winooski, then your child is eligible to participate.

How much will Winooski School District pay?

The statewide rate of \$3,764.00 per child was established by the Agency of Education for the 2023/2024 school year. This covers 10 hours per week of high-quality prekindergarten education for 35 weeks.

How do I apply?

Winooski residents must first be enrolled at a pre-qualified preschool program in order to receive Act 166 funding. You need to contact the program directly to enroll your child. To search pre-qualified preschool programs visit: *http://www.brightfutures. dcf.state.vt.us/*

Once enrolled in a pre-qualified preschool program, then complete the Winooski ACT 166 Pre-registration Form to let WSD know what program your child will be attending for the 2022-2023 school year. A new pre-registration form must be completed EACH year.

McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act

The McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act ensures educational rights and protections for children and youth experiencing homelessness. This legislation requires that all homeless children and youth have the same access to a free, appropriate public education as other children and youth in Vermont.

The goals of this legislation include:

- · Identifying homeless children and youth
- Immediate enrollment and facilitation of enrollment disputes
- Ensuring access to school and appropriate educational services
- Reducing school transfers and supporting educational stability and continuity
- Increasing parental choice and involvement regarding school enrollment
- Ensuring the educational rights of an unaccompanied youth, and
- Providing information about the rights of homeless children and youth

Eligible children have the right to:

- Receive a free, appropriate education
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is the preference.

If the school system believes that the school selected is not in the best interest of the children, then the school system must provide a written explanation of its position and inform families of the right to appeal its decision.

- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if requested.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to children's needs.

Update from JFK Elementary

Learning the Recorder

4th grade JFK students have started learning the recorder and have started a unit called "Recorder Karate!" There are nine songs within the unit, with each one getting progressively harder. Each time students pass a song, they receive a "belt" to tie around their recorder. Students need to show understanding in note literacy, hand position, fingerings, and tone in order to pass each "belt." They are off to an impressive start as they have already mastered their first song to earn their white belts and are eagerly working towards their second, the yellow belt. Students come to class excited to learn and love to show off their progress!

EL Curriculum

Grade levels are wrapping up their first EL module. Kindergarten completed their Building Literacy in a Collaborative Class: Toys and Play module and have started their Learning through Science and Story:

Weather Wonders module. First grade completed their Tools and Work module and have begun their What's Up in the Sky: A Study of the Sun, Moon, and Stars. Our second graders learned all about different schools in their Schools and Community module, and have moved on to Learning through Science and Story: Fossils Tell of Earths Changes. Our third graders are learning about Overcoming Learning Challenges Near and Far and Researching to Build Knowledge and Teach Others: Adaptations and the Wide World of Frogs concurrently. They will





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finish both modules soon. Our fourth graders have learned all about Poetry, Poets, and Becoming Writers, and are now learning about Researching to Build Knowledge and Teach Others: Animal Defense Mechanisms. During the week of January 16th our high school paused to reflect, grow, and celebrate student learning. Students in grades 9-12, as well as our students who participate in our tech centers, presented their learning in our Graduate Expectations (GX's). Student work was grounded in artifacts/evidence from their semester learning experiences, and shared with peers and adults for feedback and support on next steps. Students who did not present, learned from other students on how to present learning and receive feedback. Additionally, exhibitions provided teachers with rich feedback on how they can continue to support students on their learning journeys.

When students know they will share their work with an audience beyond the classroom, they are motivated to make it high quality. Recently, Winooski High School (WHS) students exhibited their work in all 6 Graduate Expectations known commonly to us as GXs. Exhibitions showcase what students have learned, how they thought critically, problem solved, and revised their work through multiple drafts. Exhibitions are a great way for students to share their writing, speeches, art work, performances, experiments, engineering projects, business plans, podcasts, or videos.

Here at WHS exhibitions set the expectation that all students, not just a select group, are capable of producing high-quality work that must be shared with people beyond their classroom. They motivate all students to do their best, so they can stand proudly beside their work. Recently, we celebrated our students' journey of learning during our Expo week, short for exhibition. From this culmination of the first semester, we look forward to the next half of the school year. Our second Expo week happens in June, at the end of the school year.

This month we are looking forward to in person Student and Family Conferences that will happen on Thursday, February 23rd and Friday, February 24th. Conferences for both the middle and high school will ideally include the student and will provide an opportunity for the family, student, advisor and possibly a key teacher or other adult to discuss each student's goals for the school year. We support students taking the lead on sharing their learning and experiences and then engage everyone to contribute or share their perspective on the student's goals.




Alumni Basketball Game

WSD's Renovation Transparency: Students and teachers Reflect on the Process

WSD's \$57.8M renovation, announced in 2020, is set to be completed by the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year. According to the WSD website, the Capitol Project, funded by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development Community Facilities Direct Loan, has developed 75,000 sq ft of new learning areas. These areas include a new gym, middle school, and elementary school wing, along with



Krista Parisi, executive assistant to the superintendent commented, "The renovations were addressing a lack of muchneeded space for our students, staff, and community. The design team was working to improve our learning environments and create open spaces that brought in natural light and allowed for shared gathering spaces for students in each grade level/ school." This project has aimed to "improve comfort" in an environmentally friendly way with its conscious approach towards renewable energy and more modern "pod design" in the elementary and middle school, rather than traditional classroom spaces. As well as a full school-based health center, a more significant performing arts center, and a new cafeteria.

The original estimated term of completion was August 2022. However, the lack of working personnel and other technical factors caused the project to be setback several months. "The pandemic brought labor shortage issues, decreased crew sizes due to positive COVID tests, and some very serious supply and shipping issues," Parisi said.

Students and faculty are eager for information on the newly updated space. "It was supposed to be done in November, but now it's been pushed back a couple of months." Theo Abbott-Smith '25 said. "And I think other parts were delayed even more than that."

Thanks to the support from members at ReArch, a construction company based in South Burlington, and TruexCullins, an architecture and interior design firm with a focus on education projects, the renovation was able to move forward despite the setbacks. Parisi adds, "We were extremely lucky to work with some great people from ReArch and TruexCullins that were as determined as we were to move forward with this project and stay on track for an on-time completion of the project."

To keep the student population and the public notified of these setbacks, the news was given at public monthly meetings, "Updates were communicated to the Capital Project Executive Committee during their monthly meetings. Each of these meetings was a warned public meeting that anyone could attend." Parisi said. District-wide specific information was conveyed



through WSD community emails. Parisi notes, "Staff and community updates were sent out regularly via email by Emily Hecker, our then Director of Communication, and continue to be sent out by Gabby Hora our current Director of Communication."

When interviewed, WHS students expressed a desire for information regarding the project to be more easily accessible. "Yeah, it would have been a lot better just to know, like, what's going

on." Klara Bronz-Russo '26 said. Alexis Blend '25 added, "They told us tons of different dates for when it was going to be fully finished. And it would have been really nice to have an actual date."

"I looked into a lot, but there wasn't really a lot of information to be found. I don't think there was really a lot of information being put out there for people to learn about to know what was going on" Theo Abbott-Smith '25 said.

George Rogers '23 offered possible solutions to this lack of accessible information, "I wish there was like something we could see on the school website of like a process bar where it like gives us consistent updates on how far until the school is done."

Alexis Blend '25 commented on the renovation process, and its effect on her mental health, "When I'm in school, anxiety is a really big problem. There's banging all over the school and like there's not really space to get out of the classroom to breathe and move around." She adds, "It's affected the coping mechanisms that I have for dealing with that during school."

Marc McQuinn, a WHS history teacher remarked, "I'm not sure what to say is the biggest disruption to education in my teaching career. I'm not sure if it's COVID or construction. The fact that they were happening at the same time, it's just unbelievable."

Looking ahead to the final stretch of construction, having a fully finished school is on many students' minds. With the main lobby recently opening up, Nixandy Ferdinand '24 described the convenience of this new space, "You had to like go all around the school to finally get in. By the time you got there, it's like late so you had to get here extra early. When we got the new entrance it got better."

"It's hard to get around. I don't know where things are most of the time, but I'm getting used to it." Deanna McCoy '24 said.

Recalling his school experience, McQuinn mentioned, "I can go back to my days as a student here back in the 1980s, but certainly since I've been teaching here, the population has become more and more diverse over time. For towns like Winooski to get a building like this, I think is awesome. Winooski kids deserve a nice place to go to school too."



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From Your Local Representatives

Hi Neighbors!

Our 2023-24 legislative is underway and comes with a whole host of changes: new faces, new committees, and new priorities. On the first day, we re-elected Representative Jill Krowinski as our Speaker of the House - this took a total of 12 minutes, in stark contrast to our counterparts in DC. We also received our committee assignments; I will be returning to the House Human Services Committee and Representative Daisy Berbeco was appointed to the House Health Care Committee. These committee assignments came along with a reorganization of House committees. Most notably, the House Energy & Technology Committee was dissolved and the priorities of this committee were added to the newly created Environment & Energy Committee and Government Operations & Military Affairs.

Over in the Senate, Senator Phil Baruth was elected as the Senate Pro Tempore (or Senate President) and he will continue to serve on the Senate Judiciary Committee as well as Senate Appropriations Committee. As for our new Chittenden Central Senators, Senator Tanya Vyhovsky was appointed as Vice Chair of the Senate Government Operations Committee and a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee. Senator Martine Larocque Gulick was appointed as Vice Chair of the Senate Education Committee and a member of the Senate Health & Welfare Committee.

The first week of our legislative session was largely ceremonial in nature and did not involve significant policy work. Though before the Governor's Inaugural Address, we did get to witness the swearing in of Winooski's own Mike Pieciak as our State Treasurer who made history as Vermont's first out LGBTQ+ person to serve as treasurer. We also witnessed Vermont's first woman elected as Attorney General, Charity Clark, be sworn into office.

Over the course of this first month, our body will primarily focus on getting new members acclimated to their committees and the departments / policy areas that they oversee. I encourage folks to watch the livestreams of any committees of interest as they will provide great overviews for legislators and community members throughout the session.

COVID-19 Information

The City of Winooski encourages our residents and visitors to do everything they can to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Stay up to date on vaccinations.

Vaccines are the best tool we have to protect ourselves against COVID-19, especially from severe illness, hospitalization and death. Vermonters ages 6 months and older can get vaccinated, including with the new "bivalent" vaccines. Bivalent vaccines protect against older and newer strains circulating in Vermont. We strongly encourage you to protect yourself by getting vaccinated as soon as possible.

Stay home if sick.

Whether you have symptoms of COVID-19, the flu, or another contagious illness, please stay home if you are sick and call your health care provider if needed. (If you don't have a health care provider, call 2-1-1.) This helps keep germs from spreading, protects those who may be at risk of serious illness, and gives you a chance to get well.

Continue to wear a mask in public.

While masking is no longer mandatory in Vermont, community members can still use this important preventative tool. Examples of high-quality masks are N95 or KN95 masks, which are very good at blocking the droplets from our breath that spreads the virus. You can also wear a well-fitting mask with at least two layers of tightly-woven fabric, or layer a disposable mask under a cloth mask to increase effectiveness.

Get tested when needed.

You can protect others by getting tested if you have COVID-19 symptoms or if you are a close contact of someone who tested positive for COVID-19, so you can decide whether to isolate. It's especially important to get tested if you are at higher risk for COVID-19, so you can reach out to your health care provider to ask about treatment. Free COVID tests are available at the Winooski Clerk's Office at 27 W Allen St., the Winooski Library at 32 Mallets Bay Ave, and the Winooski Senior Center at 123 Barlow St.

Please note: walk-in vaccination clinics

provided by the Vermont Department closed on January 31st. Vaccines will continue to be widely available, at no cost to the patient, by appointment at doctors' offices, pharmacies, or other locations where vaccines are offered. Vermonters who do not have a health care provider or access to a pharmacy can reach out to their Local Health Office to be vaccinated. The Health Department will also continue to work with partners to vaccinate homebound Vermonters, English language learners, and immigrant or refugee community members.

2023 Dog Licenses Now Available!

Please note it is Vermont State Law to license a dog (6 months or older) each year. To license your dog, we will need a currently valid rabies certificate. Each dog owner will need to license the dog on or before April 3rd. On April 4th, an additional late fee will be applied.

• \$14 (altered) on or before April 1st

- \$18 (un-altered) on or before April 1st
- On April 2nd, there will be additional late fees!

Winooski City Hall will be closed on Monday, February 20th, 2023 for Presidents Day.



Citywide Reappraisal

The City of Winooski was ordered by the State of Vermont to complete a citywide reappraisal. State law requires Vermont municipalities to reappraise all forms of property when the Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) falls below 85% or rises above 115%. The purpose of the citywide reappraisal is to ensure that every property taxpayer is paying their fair share of (but not more than) property taxes.

The city-wide reappraisal will be completed in phases during a two-year process.

- On June 15th, the City of Winooski began to send out letters (street by street) to property owners requesting information or inspection.
- On July 1, the City's contracted appraiser began field work which includes a market study that establishes preliminary valuation tables and schedules for the reappraisal.
- If you are a property owner, please keep an eye out for one of these letters as we make our way through each address.

The new values are set to begin on April 1st, 2024 for the 2024-25 budget and tax year.

Social Host Responsibilities According to our



last parent survey, most parents in Winooski aren't providing substances to their youth. That is important, because when parents or peers provide alcohol to people under 21, it increases youth risk for binge drinking, drinking and driving, and other alcohol-related problems. Social hosting, or providing alcohol to a minor in a home or other setting, is illegal in Vermont. Furthermore, communities sometimes enact additional stronger or more specific ordinances. Social host laws are considered a best practice and have been shown to help reduce the amount of underage alcohol use that occurs in a state or community. Winooski Food Shelf Schedule for February

We are now back to our regular monthly schedule of the 2nd and 4th Wednesday afternoons and 2nd and 4th Saturday mornings of each month.

We will continue to receive diapers from the Diaper Bank at least until July. We are hoping the State Legislature will vote to fund a Vermont Diaper Bank. The need is there. Low income families want healthy, happy babies who are not suffering with diaper rash and infections. Clean diapers are critical to baby health. Currently, we are supplying diapers and wipes to 250 Winooski babies each month.

Thank you to everyone who had provided funds, food and toiletries to the Food Shelf in 2022. You are the reason we have been able to send food home to 1,300 people each month! Each family takes home a 2 to 3 day supply of food each time they come. Each family can come one Wednesday and two Saturdays each month.

We are asking for donations of cooking oil, dried beans, children's cereals, and condiments such as mayo, ketchup and mustard. Store bought packages of cookies are always appreciated.

Food Shelf Policy: Winooski residents coming for the first time should bring proof that they live in Winooski such as a utility bill or rental lease. Winooski residents may access the pantry staples one Wednesday each month. They may also come both Saturdays to stock up on bread, pastry and some fresh fruits and veggies.

Shaw's in Colchester and Winooski's own Commodities Natural Market help supply Saturday's food.

Where to find us: The Food Shelf is located in the United Methodist Church at 24 West Allen Street. We do not provide rides so please bring a wheeled cart or suitcase and some bags to lug your food home. The church phone number is 802-655-7371.

Cash donations needed: The Food Shelf is growing rapidly. More and more of the food must be purchased since donations of food items cannot meet demand. Checks can be mailed to: The Winooski Food Shelf, P.O. Box 53, Winooski, VT 05404. You may also donate at winooskifoodshelf.org.

Donation Drop Off Locations: Please do not leave food on our doorstep when we are closed. Instead, please bring unexpired and unopened food donations to: Commodities Natural Market, 65 Winooski Falls Way, phone: 448-3340. We especially need toiletries: toothpaste, tooth brushes, deodorant, shampoo, disposable razors and toilet paper. Thank you for caring about our neighbors!


