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Letter from the Mayor

Hello neighbors, Winooski is diverse in background, language, race, economic status, and so much more – this is one of the great things about our community and provides an important



opportunity to make sure everyone's voices are heard in the public process. Inclusion begins with meaningful engagement and it is imperative for our local leaders to connect directly and often with our residents, businesses, visitors, and especially those who are under-represented. We're making some good progress in reducing the barriers to local government and moving forward to address the findings in the joint city/ school equity audit that was completed last year. You can learn more about these initiatives at *winooskivt.gov/equity*, here a few I'd like to mention:

City Council Equity Assessment Worksheet:

The City Council adopted this worksheet to analyze our annual budget items and policy/ordinance changes to identify potential equity impacts whether they are positive, negative, intentional, or unintentional. This useful tool was used during our Strategic Prioritization process this year and we're looking forward to referencing it as we move forward with important community decisions. Addressing the Housing Crisis:

Our newly hired Housing Initiative Director has begun their work in this area an serves as the staff liaison to the Winooski Housing Commission. We're also working on the adoption of amendments to our land use regulations that incentivize the construction of priority house (3+ bedroom availability, accessory dwelling units, and pricing in the 80-120% area median income range). More ordinance updates are also in the works to strengthen our ability to enforce health/safety codes. I'm also proud of the work we're doing to educate and train landlords and renters - through a monthly meeting of local housing and service providers, we have supported collaboration between the Champlain Valley Office of Economic Opportunity (CVOEO), UVM Health, the Winooski Housing Authority (WHA), and the Winooski School District to deliver rental resources in multiple languages. The group is working to develop this expertise within community members for ongoing support.

Strategies to Increase Civic Participation among BIPOC Residents:

The City Council finalized a community access and engagement process that identifies 30 community groups to establish regular engagement opportunities with. As of August, we have formally met with 5 senior groups, 3 youth groups, 5 multilingual groups, and a local non-profit organization. These important interactions help us build upon the engagement happening during our community programs, events, and other existing partnerships. The recently established Inclusion and Belonging Commission focuses directly on improving these aspects in Winooski, and

October Update

Dear Winooski School Community, Much is happening on our end. Some of it you will read in other sections of this newsletter, and some of it you will hopefully experience in person! I enjoyed several events related to Hispanic Heritage Month and October's Indigenous Peoples Day. I have been highly energized meeting so many of you over the past few months and it pleases me to see the schools play such a central role in bringing our community together. If you have not done so already, please consider following us on Instagram (@WinooskiLearns) or Facebook (@ Winooski School District) for updates and very many photos of our schools in action.

One important thing to note is that we made a small change to our calendar for April 8th. We will have an early release on this day for everyone, except Pre-K (no school for them). This is due to the projected traffic disruptions on that day related to the full solar eclipse. Please plan accordingly and ensure that if your students choose to look at the eclipse they do so safely using the eclipse glasses we will be providing to them.

On another note, we carried out our first options-based drill at the end of Semester, as was originally required by the Agency of Education. They have since changed that guidance, but only after we had completed it. While we had an overall successful drill, we were reminded of the emotional toll this takes on many



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members of our community. It makes us reflect that preparing for violent situations in our schools is something that should not be normal. Still, I am glad we have a few more months until the next drill and more of an opportunity to be prepared both logistically and emotionally for it. We will be using the April early release time to train our teams again. Our safety committee is continuing to actively work on planning developmentally appropriate ways to communicate these expectations to our students.

Finally, VTCAP results were recently released. This is the standardized test that the state of Vermont requires of every student 3rd through 12th grade. Much controversy has surrounded this test, including changing vendors last minute last year and a chaotic first administration across the state. This has resulted in yet another year of decreased validity and confidence in the data. However, the scores have a strong impact on how success is measured for districts. We are digesting results carefully and planning on how to incorporate this information to improve instruction moving forward. All families will receive copies of their results later in the fall, but please keep in mind that this is only one measure of several and that our teachers are best equipped to gauge your student's progress toward their goals.

Winooski Anti-Racism Steering Committee Update

On Monday, October 2nd, youth and adults from the Winooski community gathered for the second meeting of the 2023-2024 Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC). This team is tasked with implementing the six demands of the Winooski Students for Antiracism (WSA): to form a truth and reconciliation committee, hire and retain more faculty of color, establish a multilingual mentoring program, implement an ethnic studies curriculum, conduct an equity audit of the school, and host a yearly workshop for students where they can learn about their civil rights.

During this meeting, the members of the ARSC took part in community building activities, then took a deep dive into the Antiracism Demands and the work of the ARSC through a gallery walk. They read the original 2020 letter to the school board from WSA, then took a look at the history and current standing of the six demands. They also practiced speaking about the work of the ARSC with different members of the community through a "wagon wheel" activity. After the meeting, each member of the committee was sent a survey about which of the six demands they want to focus on as the year gets started.

We are particularly excited to add new



Winooski School board member Isaiah Donaldson to both the ARSC and our planning team. His ability to represent the committee at monthly school board meetings will be invaluable as the work moves from research and exploration to action and implementation. The planning team also includes Director of Early Learning, Maybeline Lopez, Winooski alum and Youth Program Specialist Evelyn Monje, former Winooski student Auishma Pradhan, now a junior at South Burlington High School, as well as Mea Ree Jan, a junior at Winooski and the Essex Tech Center. Auishma and Mea Ree are also youth facilitators at UP for Learning.

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The ARSC is made up of an incredible group of passionate community members, and we can't wait to see how the committee's new structure, as well as more frequent meetings, help to expedite its progress this year.

JFK Update

JFK Family Morning Meeting

Every classroom at JFK Elementary School starts their day with a Morning Meeting. Morning Meeting is a particular and deliberate way to begin our day together. All classroom members—grown-ups and students—gather in a circle, greet each other, and listen and respond to each other. Morning Meeting is made up of four parts: greeting, sharing, group activity, and morning message. The components intentionally provide opportunities for students to practice the skills of greeting, listening and responding, group problem-solving, and noticing and anticipating.

This fall. every classroom will invite families to join their student's class for a Morning Meeting. Some classes have already had their fall family Morning Meeting, some are scheduled, and some are still in the planning stage. Sharing this foundational practice with our families is an intentional way to give our families a glimpse into their students' day. It also gives the other students and school adults a chance to connect with adults from home. This is the first time in a few years we have been able to



invite families in for a Morning Meeting. It has been amazing to see everyone in the building again!

JFK Parent Teacher Conferences

On **November 16th and 17th**, JFK will have our fall parent-teacher conferences. Fall conferences are an opportunity for school adults and home adults to connect and learn about our students from each other. Every student at JFK participates in activities during the beginning of the school year that help them articulate their Hopes and Dreams for the school year. These Hopes and Dreams are shared at conferences so all adults in the student's life can support them in achieving those Hopes and Dreams. During conferences, school adults will also share the strengths they have discovered in students as they have gotten to know them this year, as well as the student's academic assessments and progress to date. Our families' involvement and partnership with the school are invaluable for our student's success.

Third Grade

We've had quite an exciting start to third grade! We've spent the first six weeks getting to know each other and building our learning communities in a variety of ways including readalouds, games, art, and community circles.

In Math, we're working on creating and interpreting scaled bar and picture graphs, leading us to multiplicative reasoning. While working toward our learning goals, we always think of how we work as a math



the core of our thinking as mathematicians.

In Literacy, we've launched Unit 1: Overcoming Learning Challenges Near and Far.

Students have observed picture and text samples from different books we will use together throughout the theme. They took notes on what they noticed and wondered, looking for patterns and clues to guess the topic. Our first story, Waiting for the Biblioburro, takes place in Colombia. Students took notes about the main parts of the story

community. We think about what lifts us up as learners and what holds us back. We have class discussions about how we can use our Habits as mathematicians to support ourselves and each other in our learning. Examples of Habits we've been working on include private reasoning time, using math as the authority, explaining our thinking, using models and representations, making mistakes, and checking for understanding. Habits are in order to tell the "gist," a skill we will continue to practice throughout the unit. For Literacy, we've also discussed the five parts of ALL Block (Additional Language and Literacy Block). We have agreed on and practiced our small group discussion process. We used a poster walk to have conversations about what we will do during each component of ALL Block.

Learning With Circus Smirkus

An interview with Kate Grodin, WMHS Co-Principal by Miriam Greenfield, Director of Communications

This year we are celebrating our 5th residency with Circus Smirkus and artist Josh Shack. We had a Covid-19 hiatus of two years, but our current seniors were our first 6th grade to perform. That means this year the circus tradition touches the entire district with our kindergarteners being some of our most engaged audience members. I love that our 6th graders, who are right in the middle of their WSD journey have this chance to unite everyone.

Tell me about how the program started and how it's developed?

Seven years ago we were approached by Circus Smirkus to engage in a 6-week residency with them because of a grant opportunity. The middle school was just beginning to create Expeditions, 6-12 week interdisciplinary learning opportunities, so it was perfect timing. We were so impressed with the quality of the experience, from the day-to-day learning to the full performance, that we have worked hard to fund it for every 6th grade that we could. The 6th grade teachers are an incredibly collaborative group of educators who have masterfully integrated learning from circus into all disciplines.

What do the students take out from the experience and performance?

Our hope is that students enter the 6th grade and use this residency as a time to re-engage with each other as middle schoolers; they're not elementary students any more. Circus demands all the physicality of a sport, but it's focused on a collaborative product, not a competition. It's a great way to set the stage for middle school learning.

What impressed you most about the students over these last three weeks?

Every year the students surprise us with where they take their skills. This year, for me, I thought the clown acts were superb and the balancing on the big ball! I have tried to stand on that thing and it is really challenging. I cannot begin to imagine juggling up there!

Last year, we made some important budgeting decisions to create more engagement opportunities, such as expanding the hours of our Children & Family Program Manager (increasing access to our year-round after school program for working families) and hiring a Community Services Admin & Outreach Coordinator (providing additional access to and registration support of our Community Services programs). We're also focused on the process involved to create a municipal language access plan and a special equity audit event that will engage many of our residents to address these issues.

Evolve Advertising and Recruitment Practices to Diversify the Workforce:

The City's Human Resources Director and City Manager have made changes to these practices and are exploring ways to improve outreach and support. In addition to employment opportunities, we've also made investments that focus on early engagement, such as offering free skill building training programs to teens.

Strengthen Collaboration with the Winooski School District (WSD):

In addition to recognizing the WSD Superintendent as a member of City leadership, both the City Manager and I meet with the Superintendent on a regular basis to work on issues where partnership provides meaningful outcomes. Leadership members of the City and WSD are also focused on engaging with each other's community events and representative bodies. Last month, we held our annual joint meeting of the City Council and School Board, which is integral to keeping us on task and moving the conversations forward. The City also continues to work with WSD multilingual liaisons through a

stipend agreement for as-needed support. This approach has allowed us to conduct listening and info sessions with our multilingual community members for important initiatives such as All-Resident Voting, American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding, Just Cause Eviction, and more. And, I would be remiss if I didn't mention the WSD's successful efforts to provide year-round bus transportation for students, which included increases in driver pay and training opportunities.

With these successes in mind, we're looking forward to the annual budget planning process which will occur through the winter leading up to the Town Meeting Day election in March 2024. This important process directly impacts all of our residents, and we encourage as many people to get involved as possible. As of last month, we directed the staff to present us with a budget that retains current services and allows for catching up on some deficiencies, prioritizing our municipal infrastructure (i.e. streets, sidewalks) for any additional investment - something we hear about often from most community demographics. Affordability and strategic tax increases are at the forefront of our minds moving forward - please stay tuned for ways to engage during the budget process. In the coming weeks, all of our budget info will be available on our website at winooskivt.gov/fy25.

From Your Local Representative

Dear Neighbors,

I hope this message finds you well. Although our legislative session hasn't officially kicked off yet, I wanted to share some key takeaways from a recent committee hearing I was part of regarding Act 81. The meeting was a collaborative effort between the House Committee on Human Services and the Senate Committee on Health & Welfare, with the aim of gaining a better understanding of the growing homelessness issue in our state.

A quick refresher on Act 81, also known as H.171: It was passed during a special legislative session and signed into law not long after. One of the main goals of this legislation was to bridge the gap between the end of the pandemicera emergency housing program on June 30, 2023, and the introduction of a transitional benefit program running until April 1, 2024. The aim was to prevent the worsening of Vermont's homelessness crisis and alleviate the strain on our community action agencies.

Homelessness challenges have been magnified by various factors, including flooding, a limited housing supply, and changes in the demographics of those experiencing homelessness. During the committee hearing, we had the privilege of hearing from community leaders, stakeholders, state officials, and, most importantly, individuals who have experienced homelessness themselves.

Brian shared his journey from homelessness to stable housing, highlighting the difficulties in accessing support services and frequent changes in service coordinators. Rebecca talked about her experiences of chronic homelessness, shedding light on systemic failures, such as a shortage of available accommodations, inadequate support, and the ongoing struggle to secure permanent housing. It became clear that the application process for various assistance programs is often convoluted and lengthy, with confusing questions that need clarification. Staffing shortages and prolonged recertification wait times are additional hurdles, emphasizing the need for better data sharing and communication.

The wait times for housing case managers, sometimes as long as six weeks, are mainly due to staffing shortages. While coordinated entry initiatives

have made progress in connecting more households, the shortage of housing navigators and system capacity remains a challenge.

One of the most significant findings from the hearing was that Act 81, in its current form, has created confusion and disrupted the process of receiving assistance during emergencies. This was a known issue, but it's crucial to reiterate: Vermont's homelessness crisis requires a more permanent solution. Currently, we rank second in the nation for homelessness. It's clear that we need to invest in a more proactive, long-term plan for households without alternative housing options after April 1st, as well as those who aren't eligible for the extended benefit and are still experiencing homelessness.

The Vermont Housing and Conservation Board is actively working on developing permanent affordable housing units across the state, with a goal of completing 1,500 units by 2025, recognizing that some projects may face challenges. One pathway forward to address homelessness is exploring opportunities and barriers to partnerships between the private sector and public entities. Collaborations between private housing developers and community action agencies can play a vital role in finding a long-term solution.

Efforts are underway to modernize the general assistance program, making it more equitable and accessible. The Chair of the House Human Services Committee has made it clear that this will be a top priority in the upcoming legislative session.

In a nutshell, the hearing shed light on several critical issues Vermont is facing when it comes to addressing our homelessness crisis comprehensively. We need to streamline emergency assistance programs, expand eligibility for assistance, and work toward a more permanent solution. The commitment to developing affordable housing units, forming public-private partnerships, and modernizing assistance programs are all crucial steps to effectively tackling this pressing issue.



Community Vision

Economic Vitality:

In October, the Finance Commission met with the Municipal Infrastructure Commission to discuss capital improvement needs. During the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget development process, City Council received a list of unfunded needs as context. These important funding needs will continue to be discussed at the Commission level in November.

Municipal Infrastructure:

The Winooski Main Street Revitalization Project, which went out to bid this summer, received three competitive bids from qualified contractors with the lowest bid exceeding the engineer's estimate by 26%. The City of Winooski is actively working on costsaving measures to reduce the overall budget and seeking additional funding. Specific details regarding the City's budget optimization efforts, contractor selection, and construction schedule will be shared with the public in the coming months as information becomes available. A public information meeting will be held prior to the start of construction which is anticipated to begin in Spring 2024. Housing:

During their meeting in September, the Winooski Housing Commission welcomed new members, discussed an interest rate buydown policy addition to the Winooski Housing Trust Fund, and introduced a draft framework that may create a short-term rental policy in Winooski. The action to create this policy was first initiated as a priority for City Council and is now in the hands of the Housing Commission, which is actively exploring policy mechanisms that will target the City's housing goals. Community members are encouraged to get involved in this process and the Housing Commission wants to hear from you. Learn more about the City's housing initiatives at winooskivt.gov/housing.

Safe, Healthy, Connected People:

On October 2nd, the City's Community Service Director provided the City Council with a goal update on this area. Items included recruitment and retention of paid on-call part-time staff for the Fire and Code Enforcement departments, a Strategic Vision Plan for fire/EMS delivery models (including dispatching), plans for possible future renovation of existing fire station to accommodate 24/7 staffing, continuing to make progress on the Parks and Open Space Plan, and determining a future plan for the Winooski Senior Center on the St. Stephens property (123 Barlow St).
