# **Respect and Dignity for All**

This past week, I had the pleasure of joining Board Vice President Kamal Dahal in his visit to Our Lady of Providence Center. I had a wonderful visit and met some remarkable human beings, primarily former teachers and administrators or public servants. Their knowledge, wisdom, and advice were refreshing, and Kamal and I were able to provide an in-person update about our schools. One of the themes that emerged in our conversation was the need for us as a community to always love every young person in our care and to treat everyone in such a way that they are reminded of their value as full human beings worthy of respect and dignity.

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We are the future.

This principle matters in concrete ways in Winooski. We are the only district in the state where the majority of our students do not belong to the racial majority. In an ideal world, this would not matter because everyone would go about their lives never having to be reminded of this difference, but sadly, we live in one where our skin color can still mean danger or safety in real situations, not to mention unspoken and hidden biases that hold us back and compound over our lifetimes. As a person of color myself, I am familiar with the suggestion that we "exaggerate" or that our experiences of discrimination are only in our imagination. There is not much I can do to change the heart of someone who already thinks that, but there is much we can do for the children who face and will face an uphill battle just to exist. We can counter that world by doing the opposite, by providing them with excellent schooling, by allowing them to experience memorable joy, and by respecting them enough to teach them the truth about the cruelties of our history and the current world while enabling them to face the challenge with the right tools.

Although race is one of the most visible markers of difference, there are other elements that make our student body diverse. I want to encourage our staff and community not to be "colorblind" about these differences but rather recognize the richness in them. It is an act of justice to remind ourselves that our uniqueness is an asset, not a deficiency nor a mark of indignity. Sometimes, we are afraid to acknowledge these differences because we are accustomed to structures using them for abuse and oppression. But the future is better.

# **School Board Update**

As you receive this newsletter, we are immersed in the winter season. I trust that you are adequately prepared for the snow and cold that Vermont graciously bestows upon us annually during this time. Amidst the community's engagement in various winter activities, the School Board, on the other hand, is occupied with the crucial task of presenting the budget to our community.

In the forthcoming weeks leading up to the voting date on March 5th, the school board will unveil the budget in multiple forums. As a preview, I am pleased to include essential budgetary information in this newsletter. Your attention to these details will undoubtedly contribute to an informed voting decision that will shape the future of our students.

The projected total local budget for the upcoming fiscal year 2024-2025 is \$32,970,907. Notably, the state has changed the funding formula this year, shifting from the traditional method of calculating equalized pupil numbers to a new approach known as weighted long-term membership. Due to these adjustments, this fiscal year's estimated weighted long-term membership is 2160.

The revised formula is expected to bring certain budgetary advantages to Winooski this year. Assuming the forecasted Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) to be 1.01, the anticipated decrease in the equalized homestead tax rate is 34%. However, without considering the forecasted CLA, the expected decrease in the equalized homestead tax rate is approximately 3%. It's important to note that this projection considers including crucial positions in our local budget, previously federally funded. This strategic decision is crucial to ensuring that our children receive essential resources while providing relief to the community. However, predicting the exact impact on each household's tax amount is challenging, considering various factors such as varying levels of individual income and assessed property value. In our budget presentations, the board aims to display a chart illustrating the tax impacts with current and forecasted CLA for households with different ranges of assessed property values and households in different income categories.

This year's budget reflects a significant expansion of Pre-Kindergarten services in Winooski. This includes establishing



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two new classrooms and ensuring that all eligible 4-year-olds in the community have access to Pre-K education. Additionally, the budget considers incorporating most ESSER-funded investments already in the district, encompassing staff positions and contracted services, seamlessly integrating them into our local budget. This approach aims to prevent abrupt or excessive force reduction within a single year.

Our commitment extends to honoring previous pledges, such as the continued funding of equity and anti-racism initiatives in the district and the addition of a School Safety Coach. Furthermore, we recognize the necessity of meeting increased overall costs in the market, encompassing insurance expenses and negotiated salaries for staff.

In addition to these priorities, we are addressing key needs such as allocating one teacher to JFK to fulfill planning time obligations under the CBA, sustaining the Flexible Pathways Coordinator position at the high school, allocating an additional \$10,000 to each school for classroom budgets, and increasing the year-round availability of the multi-language liaison as required.

Furthermore, we are proactively increasing operational costs to tackle potential reductions in financial capacity anticipated in the coming years effectively. This comprehensive budgetary approach ensures a balanced allocation of resources to support educational excellence and community well-being.

Finally, dear residents, your well-informed participation plays a vital role in shaping the future of our school. As we are near the voting date on March 5th, I urge each of you to engage in this democratic process actively. Register to vote and fulfill your responsibility by voting for our budget question and voting to select your board members. Regardless of how you vote, your involvement guarantees representative governance and directly impacts the trajectory of our schools and community.

Let's unite to ensure our voices resonate and contribute to the overall well-being of Winooski. Your vote is significant, and your informed choice will guide our path forward.

# Winooski School District Antiracism Steering Committee Update

On Monday, December 18th, youth and adults from the Winooski community gathered for the sixth meeting of the 2023-2024 Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC). This team is tasked with implementing the six demands of the Winooski Students for Antiracism (WSA): to form a truth and reconciliation commission, hire and retain more faculty of color, establish a multilingual mentoring program, implement an ethnic



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studies curriculum, conduct an equity audit of the school, and host a yearly workshop for students where they can learn about their civil rights.

The meeting began with a pizza dinner and then an opening circle, when each member of the team shared their resolutions and intentions for the new year. The committee then broke into small groups to continue to make edits to the survey they had been creating, which posed questions about the ARSC and the status of the antiracism demands. They plan to distribute the survey to Winooski middle and high school youth in late January. Another small group met to discuss and plan the work of the racial truth and reconciliation commission, and a third group met to discuss the committee's response to the shooting of three Palestinian college students in Burlington on November 25th. At the close

of the meeting, each group shared their progress and next steps.

As always, it was a spirited and productive meeting! We are thrilled about all of the exciting progress being made at Winooski School, particularly the funding of the new Multilingual Mentorship Coordinator position.

# Winooski School District Child Find Notice

The Winooski School District is required by federal law to locate, identify and evaluate all children with disabilities. The process of locating, identifying, and evaluating children with disabilities is known as Child Find. The Winooski School District conducts a Kindergarten Screening every spring, but parents may call to make an appointment to discuss their concerns at any time. As the school district of residence, we have the responsibility to identify and provide services to any child with special needs who may require special education and related services in order to access and benefit from public education.

If you have, or know of any resident, who has a child with a disability under the age of 21, including children enrolled in a private school located in Winooski by parent choice or are being home-schooled, we would like to hear from you. Sometimes parents/ guardians are unaware that special education services are available to their children.

# **Health Office News**

With winter in full swing, we are experiencing increased strep cases in the district. Please be mindful if your student is experiencing a sore throat, especially with a headache, stomachache, or fever. Reach out to your child's pediatrician if noting these symptoms to determine if they need to be assessed or tested further. If your child tests positive for strep, they may return to school 24 hours after their first dose of antibiotics. Additionally, it would be best if you changed out your child's toothbrush after 48 hours of antibiotic use. Please discourage sharing food/drinks during this time to decrease the spread. If your child does test positive, a courtesy call to the health office here at WSD would be much appreciated

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# NOOSKI Letter from the Mayor

Hello Winooski. The Town Meeting Day election is on Tuesday, March 5, 2024! Thanks to everyone who has provided feedback during the budget process. Be sure to join us for the City and School Budget Presentation Community Dinner on **February 19**, then for the final presentation on March 4. For all things election, ballot, and budget, visit *winooskivt.gov/ townmeeting*. Here's a few notes about municipal ballot items:

**City Budget** - with high inflation over recent years, we're looking at a higherthan-average tax rate increase just to keep up with salaries and benefits, plus



some extra investment in capital projects and other programming to keep up with service demand as our city grows. If voters approve the budget, we'll move forward with these investments. If voters don't approve the budget, a different budget will be proposed and a special election will be held.

Local Representatives:

Vote for Mayor, two City Councilors, two Winooski School District Trustees, and a Champlain Water District Representative. Look out for local forums and reach out to candidates with questions!

Burlington-Winooski River Bridge Replacement Bond: There will likely be a bond question on the ballot (not official/finalized at the time of writing this update) related to the Burlington/ Winooski Bridge Replacement Project (*burlingtonwinooskibridge.vtransprojects. vermont.gov*). The State has received grant funding to support this project, and request that Winooski and Burlington contribute a local match (currently estimated at \$3,000,000). If approved by voters, this amount gets paid back over time with tax dollars.

Don't forget, all legal residents, regardless of citizenship status, can vote on local City/School ballot items on Town Meeting Day. Learn how to register to vote and use our voting resources at *winooskivt.gov/vote*.

# **From Your Local Representative**

Happy 2024, Winooski! I am writing from the beautiful Golden Dome in Montpelier where we kicked-off the legislative session on January 3rd. In the first week of session we overturned the veto of the Bottle Bill, which will increase recycling and reduce litter by expanding the number of redeemable beverage containers.

We have also passed a bill to add "coercive controlling behavior" to the definition of abuse for the purpose of obtaining a relief from abuse order, and a bill to pilot two overdose prevention centers. I supported both bills and spoke on the floor about the connection between substance use and mental health issues, and why people struggling with them need compassionate neighbors, friends, and family to be nearby.

The legislature will remain focused on housing this session through legislation that modernizes Act 250. Efforts to improve public safety will include exploring mechanisms to address court

backlogs, as well as ensuring justiceinvolved people with a serious mental health issue are in the appropriate setting. The Vermont Supreme Court leads a Commission on Mental Health and the Courts, which is exploring how to reform current practices around getting these folks timely, appropriate care when they are in the criminal justice system. I have been invited to join the Commission and will be updating you all on progress and our recommendations. I am also the House Health Care budget liaison for the Committee on Appropriations. I've been digging deep in the Governor's recommended budget adjustments (BAA) to the FY23 budget. Having received the BAA later than usual from the Administration, we are working very hard to investigate the shifts in funds and millions in unspent allocations, which often suggests the legislative intent was unmet.

Many of you are hearing about property taxes right now. Winooski's increase will be on the lower end of the range of property tax rate hikes that are being driven in part by the new education funding formula. I encourage you to visit the City of Winooski website for more information on their budget process.

I have enjoyed hearing from so many of you over the past months. It is important that you raise your voice so I can continue to fully represent our great city — DBerbeco@leg.state.vt.us.

# Winter Parking Ban Reminder

For everywhere else in Winooski (December 1 – March 31), overnight winter parking bans are made during winter storms and for snow removal where street parking is not allowed from 11pm to 7am.

### **Main Street Revitalization**

The Main Street Revitalization Project is on track to start this spring. The project aims to improve the roadway along the Main Street corridor, starting at the New England Central Railroad bridge near the intersection with Maple Street and extending to the Winooski-Colchester town line near the Winooski School District. The project includes water, sewer, stormwater, and utility infrastructure improvements, roadway aesthetic upgrades, new traffic signals, and bicycle/pedestrian facilities.

The City of Winooski awarded the construction contract to Kubricky-Jointa Lime, LLC in December 2023 after implementing project cost reductions and securing additional funding. The Project Team will hold a public information meeting in March, prior to the start of construction. Details to follow.

#### WPP Becomes 3-4-50 Partner

The numbers 3-4-50 refer to 3 behaviors – no physical activity, poor diet, and tobacco use – that lead to 4 diseases – cancer, heart disease & stroke, type 2 diabetes, and lung disease – that lead to more than 50% of early death in Vermont. Organizations that become 3-4-50 partners sign a letter of commitment to act over the next year to reduce unhealthy behaviors that contribute to disease.
