Letter from the Mayor

Hello Neighbors, I hope you've been enjoying a peaceful winter and festive holiday season. Kudos to Downtown Winooski and our local businesses for another successful Holiday Pop Up shopping event! January brings a new



year with new hopes. It also means that the City Council, Staff, and community members are well into the fiscal year 2025 budget planning process, shaping the budget you'll vote on during the Town Meeting Day election. I encourage you all to get involved in the process, attend

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budget meetings, ask questions, and voice your opinions on how your tax dollars should be spent. For full budget details and to view the meeting schedule, visit *winooskivt.gov/fy25*.

Like many of you are experiencing, this budget is also seeing a significant impact from inflation and increasing costs. There are three proposed budgets under consideration:

- 1. Council-Directed Budget: the
 City Council's direction was for a
 modest increase to update costs
 for existing services, and includes
 some increases to catch up on some
 deficiencies, with an emphasis on
 Municipal Infrastructure, one of the
 City's four Strategic Vision/Master
 Plan goal areas. This would result in a
 projected tax rate increase of 8.7% (a
 \$249.05 increase to the city portion
 of the average property tax bill).
- 2. **City Manager Budget:** The budget proposed by the City Manager would allow for catching up in the Safe, Healthy, Connected People Strategic Vision/Master Plan goal area with a projected tax rate increase of 12.76% (a \$359.39 increase to the city portion of the average property tax bill).
- 3. Alternative budget: Should the Council decide against the proposed budget and tax increase, staff have prepared an alternative budget with a focus on catching up on the Municipal Infrastructure goal areas. This would result in a projected tax rate increase of 10.54% (a \$296.77 increase to the city portion of the average property tax bill).

The budget also projects a 5% increase to both sewer and water rates, resulting in an increased cost to the average Winooski household of \$50.76 per year (\$22.88 for water and \$27.88 for sewer). And finally, we may consider a bond vote

to pay the \$3 million local contribution requirement for the Burlington/ Winooski Bridge Replacement Project (burlingtonwinooskibridge.vtransprojects. vermont.gov).

As a reminder, last year's voterapproved budget used a big portion of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) federal grant money we received to address COVID-19 impacts to reduce the tax impact of significant increases to our Community Services staff and programs. This was a one-time opportunity - moving forward, these costs will be covered by the newly available tax revenue from paying off the Tax Increment Financing (TIF) loan related to redeveloping our downtown in the 2000s. After the specific department meetings, the overall budget discussion will occur on January 16, providing community members with one of the last remaining opportunities to weigh in! On January **22**, the City Council will vote on the final budget. We'll have the City and School **Budget Presentation and Community** Dinner on **February 19**, the final Town Meeting Day presentation on March 4, and the Town Meeting Day election on March 5.

All legal residents (regardless of citizenship status) can vote on local (City/School) ballot items during the Town Meeting Day election. You may also consider running for local office. Open terms include Mayor, two City Councilors, three School Board Trustees, and the Champlain Water District Commissioner. Visit winooskivt.gov or stop by the City Clerk's Office to get your form and petition documents, which are due back by 5pm on Monday, January 29. These incredible opportunities are perfect for those looking to serve the community in a meaningful way.


Superintendent Report

If you have not heard, Winooski is set to be able to have the ability to absorb some additional costs (like the ones previously covered

with COVID relief money) and still not feel a negative impact on our taxes, or if so, probably only minimally. On a different topic, the past month has been full of excitement mixed with learning and reflection in our schools. Students across all grades have been showcasing their academic



and extracurricular learning through a variety of events, some of which you may have enjoyed in person, and our staff continue to support our students through times of growth, change, and even difficulty.

I know that events both locally and globally continue to impact members of our community in different ways, and we want to ensure that our systems of care are strong and ready to be activated for anyone in our learning community. We continue to promote what we call "dialogical" spaces for people to talk openly about what different events mean to us locally and personally, and each of the schools has engaged in deep reflection and conversation about our own response to traumatic incidents. This is no easy work, but I am thankful for the professionalism, compassion, and empathy I have witnessed in our team members. Many of our students have expressed feelings of fear, uncertainty, and worry about what some of these things mean to their personal safety, so I ask that you join me in doing what we can to keep our students safe, learning, and always appreciated.

From The School Board

Happy New Year! What a complicated and often challenging year 2023 was for many of us and for the world at large. On a district level, we certainly had a lot of changes, but also a lot of successes this year. The School Board experienced significant turnover through the year. We celebrated the completion of our Capital Project building renovations in April. We welcomed new Superintendent Wilmer Chavarria in July. In November, our Boys Soccer team won their second championship in a row. And that's just to name a few!

As I write this in early December we are deep in budget season for Fiscal Year 25 (July 2024-June 2025). We've already had several budget work sessions as a Board, which will continue through early January. We also just completed a public feedback event this past weekend, in which Board Members gave a presentation and took a survey on attendees' budget priorities. This survey will also be distributed widely in coming weeks. Thank you to Board Members Isaiah Donaldson and Nicole Mace for taking the lead on this great new event and survey!

When you receive this newsletter in early January, we will be nearing the end of our budget discussions as a Board, but we will still very much be looking for more input and feedback from the public. We will have our final budget work session on January 3rd, with the goal of passing a budget at our regular meeting on the 10th. Then it's up to the voters! As always, we are planning several information sessions, community dinners, and other outreach efforts throughout January and February, so stay tuned for dates and times.

The vote itself will be on Town Meeting Day, the first Tuesday in March, which this year is March 5th. You can find more information about voting in Winooski here: wote

But the budget isn't the only thing the Board has been working on recently! We've continued to review and update important school policies every month; recently had a presentation on changes to the structure of High School Graduation requirements; will be meeting with legislators later in December; and much more. Our work never stops, not even for the budget!

We also recently, after a lot of discussion and self assessment, voted to recommit ourselves to Policy Governance as our system for organizing our work. This can be a complex system and with so much turnover on the Board in recent years, some pieces have not been kept up with. We have committed to changing that, which means professional development for the Board and building a better process for getting new Board Members up to speed going forward. It will be a lot of work, but worth it in the long run!

I'll close by asking again for your input and feedback. We always love to have members of the public participate at our meetings and we offer virtual options to ensure accessibility. You can also always contact us anytime using the contact information on the back of the newsletter. We look forward to hearing from you!

Winooski School District Antiracism Steering Committee Update

On Monday, November 27th, youth and adults from the Winooski community gathered for the fifth meeting of the 2023-2024 Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC). This team is tasked with implementing the six demands of the Winooski Students for Antiracism (WSA): to form a truth and reconciliation committee, hire and retain more faculty of color, establish a multilingual mentoring program, implement an ethnic studies curriculum, conduct an equity audit of the school, and host a yearly workshop for students where they can learn about their civil rights.

We want to first share the exciting news that the Winooski School Board has approved \$10,000 to contract with a Multilingual Mentor Program Coordinator! The next steps will be to post the position and to begin accepting applications. We want to express our deep gratitude to Winooski Middle School math teacher Maeve Poleman, the adult lead for this action team, as well as the many youth and other community members who have been integral to achieving this demand. The Board has

also allocated an additional \$8,500 for the committee, which will go towards their food budget, as well as stipends for additional members. We also want to thank Superintendent Wilmer Chavarria and the Board for their belief and investment in the work of the ARSC.

The meeting began with a pizza dinner, and then an opening circle, when each member of the team each shared a highlight of their Thanksgiving Break. They then turned to a partner to share their thoughts and feelings about the horrific shooting of three Palestinian college students by a white man in Burlington on November 25th. The youth facilitators, Auishma Pradhan and Mea Ree Jan, then opened up the discussion for people to share their thoughts with the whole team.

The youth and adults have many ideas about what they, as a group devoted to antiracism, can do in response to the event. Some of the ideas that came out of the discussion were to write letters to the mayoral candidates in Burlington expressing their desire for change around gun laws and racism, to host a sit-in to



share their thoughts about the shooting, to take some sort of action on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, and/or to facilitate discussions about the event during upcoming advisories or community meetings. During their next gathering on December 11th, the team will determine which actions they would like to take.

The committee then got into small groups to look over and make edits to the survey they have been creating, which poses questions about the ARSC and the status of the antiracism demands. On December 11th, they will look over the final draft of the survey, and determine when and how they will distribute it to the school community.



Learning From Each Other

A big part of our students' learning in Winooski comes from the thinking of their peers. Students have daily opportunities to share their math strategies with the rest of the class. In second grade, we usually begin each



math lesson with a Number Talk, often consisting of a series of equations that allows every student an entry point into the math. We spend "private reasoning time" thinking about the equations, followed by time where every student shares their thinking with a partner. This helps ensure that each student engages in the math.

The last part of our Number Talk is where students can share their thinking with the class, either by coming up to the screen or by using their words to explain their thought process. They are incredible at coming up with ways to solve problems and explain it to their peers, stating their reasoning in their own



words, often making it much easier for their fellow students to understand. In this way, the students are always learning from and teaching each other, giving them true ownership of the content, and giving them the confidence to try new challenges.

Rachid shares insights into his passion for music, the inspiration behind his compositions, and the profound impact it has had on his personal and academic life.

Where are you from?

I am from Brundi, but was born in the Congo. My stage name is Draken Jasper.

Tell me about your music career.

I started doing music back in Africa when I was 12 and I was singing in my Church group. My friend told me I was good at singing and I should keep it up. I started writing a couple songs for our prayer group and I didn't have an opportunity to record those because it was too expensive. I got to Vermont in April 2019. With the help of school instructional assistant Mike Webster, we wrote and recorded the song, Twende Shuleni, and we got invited to perform at the State House.

Where do you perform? How often do you perform?

I have performed in a lot of festivals, like one in Brattleboro. I performed at

Radio Bean in Burlington. I performed in Portland, Maine with A2VT. In one month, I can perform between 4-5 times, but some months, we don't have any shows.

What does music mean to you?

For me, music gives me power and helps me in hard times. I can listen to it when I feel depressed and whenever I write music it feels like I am opening up and seeing what knowledge is inside me.

Tell me about working with a professional photographer and starring in your own music video.

Working with a professional helps a lot because as an artist I need to be more on social media and post a lot about what I'm up to build my fan base. When we put the video out there, people liked it. But when I dropped my second song, people were talking more about it because I used to sing gospel, but now my music is secular.

What are you studying at Burlington Technical Center (BTC)?

I am studying how to make beats, record myself, and how to take photos. The programs I participate in are music recording and digital media lab.



How has what you've learned at BTC prepared you for the future?

It helps because it prepared me how to manage my own brand, so if I become a CEO of my own record label, I will have the skills to do that. I am learning photography, videography, but also how to make your own master so I can produce my own music.



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WINOOSKI MUNICIPAL UPDATES

Dear Neighbors,

I hope this message finds you well. As some of you may have seen, the Administration released their "December 1st letter" projecting education spending for the upcoming year jointly published by the Department of Taxes and the legislative Joint Fiscal Office. It is crucial to address the projected 18% increase in the average property tax rate. This estimate is indeed concerning and warrants careful consideration. However, it's essential to make sure that we understand the context of this projection accurately.

The early estimation of an 18% increase in the property tax rate is a preliminary assessment based on initial budget submissions from school districts across Vermont. Several factors contribute to this estimate, including inflationary pressures, the expiration of federal pandemic aid, and notably, a significant rise of approximately 16% in healthcare costs along with payments on school construction or renovation projects.

I want to emphasize that this projection is merely a starting point. School boards are currently working through their annual budget discussions, which will be presented to voters in March. Legislative action will follow in the spring when we establish the annual homestead property yield based on approved budgets and more refined revenue projections. At that juncture, we will set a tax rate aimed at covering

the anticipated needs of the statewide Education Fund.

Over the next couple of months, our focus will be on making sure that we cover what schools need without drastically increasing taxes – and we've planned ahead for this. We've saved some money aside and have plans to lower tax rates, so that we can help schools without putting too much burden on tax payers.

I know times are tough for many of us with prices going up and pay staying the same. Higher property taxes would be an unbearable burden for many. As we convene in Montpelier for the legislative session, I am committed to actively listening to our community members—neighbors, teachers, parents, business owners, and stakeholders—to navigate these challenging decisions.

I want to draw your attention to an important difference in this year's letter because the way the Administration is talking about these tax increases might not be totally fair. The Administration opted to base the projected increases on the tax rate after the CLA (Common Level of Appraisal) is applied, termed the "actual" tax rate, rather than the traditionally used equalized rate in previous comparisons. This makes it seem like the tax rate is going up by 18.5%. But when we compare it the way we usually do, it looks more like a 3.8% increase.

That's a big difference! And it's important because it changes how we move forward in addressing this issue. It's not just about schools spending too much. Other things, like how property values are going up and how we calculate taxes, are playing a big role.

The disparity between the projected 12% increase in public school budgets and the 3.8% increase in the equalized tax rate underscores the diverse revenue streams contributing to the Education Fund. The legislative decision to allocate 100% of sales and use tax to the Ed Fund alleviates reliance solely on residential property taxes, reflecting a balanced approach to funding our schools.

It is important that we review this analysis accurately to avoid unwarranted scrutiny of public schools for an 18.5% increase when the equalized rate comparison reveals a much lower percentage increase, consistent with historical assessments since the implementation of Act 60. We need to talk about using the right numbers to come up with fair ways to keep our schools great without making life harder for Vermont families.

I want to thank our own school staff and board for their commitment to transparency and community involvement as they develop next year's budget. I encourage all of you to stay engaged through the budget process and to reach out as questions arise.



Community Vision

Economic Vitality:

On December 4, the City Manager provided the City Council with an Economic Vitality update. Work to finalize amendments to the Municipal Code related to sidewalk use is underway and progress info was provided related to the Working Communities Challenge Grant, a project that builds cross-sectoral collaborations to enhance economic opportunity by advancing equity, especially for our new American residents.

Municipal Infrastructure:

On December 4, the City of Winooski, Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission, and VHB presented a draft of the Winooski Walk/Bike plan. The plan will provide the vision for a connected network of walking and biking facilities that gets people safely to where they want to go. The final plan will include a prioritized set of infrastructure recommendations with planning level cost estimates. To view the plan, visit ccrpcvt.org/our-communities/winooski.

Housing:

Amendments focused on definition changes to the City's housing chapter (9) of the municipal code were recently adopted by the City Council after a public hearing. During their meeting on December 11, the City Council received a conceptual overview of a short term rental ordinance and an amendment request to the Housing Trust Fund guidelines that include a new interest rate buydown program. Safe, Healthy, Connected People:

ODuring their recent meeting, the Safe, Healthy, Connected People Commission reviewed a draft invasive species management for Winooski's natural areas. They also discussed the future management of Memorial Park and the potential transfer of ownership and upkeep over to the Winooski Valley Park District. Annual Winter Parking Ban Reminder

There is no overnight street parking from 2:30 – 6am in Downtown Winooski from December 1 – March 31. For everywhere else in Winooski, overnight winter parking bans are made during winter storms and for snow removal where street parking is not allowed from 11pm to 7am.

- Winter parking bans may last more than one evening.
- The alerts will say when the ban starts, if it keeps going, and when it is done.
- The City of Winooski reserves the right to tow vehicles at the owner's expense.
- Landline phone users can get updates by calling 802 655 3908.
- Signs will flash at exit 15 on East Allen Street, on the Winooski side of the Winooski/Burlington Bridge, on Malletts Bay Ave, and on Main Street.
- Parking is available from 6pm to 7am in the Winooski Parking Garage on Cascade Way.
- Users can pay in the garage or by using the ParkMobile app.
- Overnight parking in the lot at the O'Brien Community Center is not allowed from 11pm to 7am (all year)
- Lawn ornaments, sports equipment, or other obstructive items must be removed from the city right-of-way

 if they are in the way and damaged during plowing, it is the responsibility of the homeowner

Main Street Revitalization Project Updates

The Winooski Main Street Revitalization Project encompasses the full reconstruction of approximately 4,000 linear feet of Winooski's Main Street. The project will improve safety, accessibility, and mobility for all modes of transportation through the corridor; replace vital water, sewer, and stormwater infrastructure; and accommodate stable growth along the corridor by eliminating physical barriers and improving the street and landscape environment.

Construction is estimated to begin in 2024! Community members are encouraged to sign up for project updates, milestone announcements, weekly construction updates, and invitations to public meetings.

Free Fentanyl & Xylazine Test Strips

Drug overdoses are on the rise. It took only eight months for the number of fatal overdoses in 2023 to surpass the entire number of overdoses the year prior. Part of the reason behind this spike is the introduction of xylazine and fentanyl into the drug supply, often added to street drugs to increase potency and enhance the effects of the substance.

Xylazine is a sedative drug that can cause cardiac arrest if too much is taken. The only way to prevent a xylazine overdose is to use test strips to see if it is present in the substance to be used.

As part of its harm reduction approach to the treatment of opiate use, Howard Center's Safe Recovery program offers free test strips that can indicate the presence of fentanyl and xylazine in any substance purchased on the street. Fentanyl is 30 to 50 times more powerful than heroin, and it only takes a very small amount to cause a fatal overdose.

According to the 11/2023 Monthly Opioid Report (healthvermont.gov), fentanyl was a factor in 95% of fatal overdoses in Vermont, and xylazine was a factor in a third of all fatal overdoses.

Without testing, it is nearly impossible to determine whether a particular sampling of opiates, pressed pills, cocaine, MDMA, methamphetamine, or any other substance may contain fentanyl or xylazine, so individuals are unaware of the presence of these substances in the drugs they are using until it is too late. The

testing procedure is relatively easy. A small



sample of the drug is mixed with water and the test strip is then dipped into the solution.

Howard Center Safe Recovery Program provides free and anonymous Fentanyl and Xylazine test strips and Narcan* (Naloxone) overdose reversal kits. Safe Recovery is open Monday-Friday from 9am – 12pm, and 1 – 5pm.

Individuals do not need to have an appointment to receive services. For more information, call Safe Recovery at 802-488-6067 during business hours as above, or you can visit Safe Recovery at 45 Clarke Street in Burlington. In the event of an overdose, please dial 9-1-1.


It's just the passage from one day to the next and one month to another, but when we click over to a new year, it has always been a time to assess our lives and decide how we might change them for the better.

Most Winooski retailers comply with signage rules

Reducing advertising for substances helps reduce overall exposure of youth and young adults under age 21 to alcohol, THC/Cannabis, and Nicotine advertising, a known driver of early substance use and cause of substance use disorder. By documenting the signage environment in Winooski, the WPP found overall, most retailers are eager to comply with current law, which doesn't allow signage to be attached to areas outside of stores, on fences, or poles. Most retailers, when asked, also supported signage laws that reduce the amount of space taken up by advertising posters in windows (usually provided by distributors, not because retailers necessarily want them). Most retailers are required to put up some amount of advertising in their windows by distributors and manufacturers to be able to sell those products. However, stronger regulation at the local level can even the playing field for all retailers and support the retailers' interests in creating a more appealing shopping experience for their customers. The Winooski Planning Commission has expressed interest in addressing this at some point in the future.
