Superintendent Update

Dear Winooski Community,
I hope you are enjoying the warmer-than-ever temperatures; we might as well. Our wonderful students always remind us of how resilient and adaptable we are as humans, and there is always time for play and joy, even in strange times. Here in the schools, the learning and fun have not ceased, and we are

sincerely grateful that the community chose to properly fund our schools for one more year.

This was an unprecedented budgeting season for many reasons. Some would say it was a “perfect storm” of factors in the same year, including a city-wide reappraisal that will update home values reflected in bills, the unprecedented increases in labor-related costs statewide, and the messy implementation of Act 127 in its first year. Still, at the end of the day, we celebrate the passage of our budget and cannot wait to deliver on its potential. The very first thing we will do is to open two new Pre-K classrooms. Our Early Childhood Program at JFK will offer a full-day 8:00am–3:00pm option for the 2024-2025 school year. We will prioritize 4-year-old students for the full school day opportunity, allowing us to support the growth of school readiness skills.

Among other important things to note for next year, we have already released our new 2024-2025 school calendar, which includes updates on holidays such as MLK day, a holiday the day after Halloween, and a first day for students on August 26.

It also moves the start of the school day to 8:15am rather than 8:00. The school doors will continue to open at 7:30am as usual, and class will still end at 3:00pm, but the bus and class schedules in the morning will move by 15 minutes. If you are a parent, caregiver, or guardian, please remember this as you plan for the next school year. We hope that by allowing teachers an extra 15 minutes before school for professional learning, planning for student support, meeting with families, and collaboration, the quality of instruction for students will be strengthened over time.

Finally, please note that the collective of districts in the Chittenden area modified its original plan regarding the April 8 eclipse. As a group, we decided to close all schools, given the high level of uncertainty about what that day may bring and what it may entail for student safety. While I prefer not to change plans that have already been set, I also understand the value of collaborating with our neighboring districts regarding weather-related closures. If you have students or children who want to witness the eclipse safely, please know that we provide free eclipse glasses in our offices.

Thank you for partnering with us in providing the most comprehensive educational program to the children and youth of Winooski.

Winooski School Antiracism Steering Committee Update

On Monday, March 11th, youth and adults from the Winooski community gathered for the tenth meeting of the 2023-2024 Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC). This team is tasked with implementing the six demands of the Winooski Students for Antiracism (WSA): to form a truth and reconciliation commission, hire and retain more faculty of color, establish a multilingual mentoring program, implement an ethnic studies curriculum, conduct an equity audit of the school, and host a yearly workshop for students where they can learn about their civil rights.

At this meeting, the ARSC took part in analyzing the data they collected through a student survey that they created and distributed this winter. At a previous meeting, members of the committee had identified five major concerns from the survey, including the disparities between students of the global majority and white students who agreed with statements such as “I have at least one adult I trust in the school/community,” and “I have experienced racial biases, prejudice, and injustices at my school.” The team discussed the five concerns, writing down possible root causes and ways to address them. At the close of the meeting, Middle School Math Teacher Maeve Poleman announced that the administration had asked if any students on the ARSC were interested in being on the hiring committee for the new Multilingual Mentor Program



Coordinator, and several volunteered. Next week, the team will meet virtually with a member of the Vermont Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) to learn more about what they do and to see how the team can apply the state’s model to Winooski School’s own TRC. Hello, Students, Families, and Community. We've had a pretty mild winter, and with the clocks "springing" ahead, we know spring is right around the corner. I've even seen some flowers poking through the ground and trees budding. That all means warmer weather will be staying around. Warmer weather brings more outside activities.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone who may be riding bikes to and from school to wear helmets. When you are riding your bike, make sure you are following the rules of the road and riding with traffic, not against it. As you've learned in P.E. with Coach B, bike riders have rules they need to follow to ensure their safety.


- Make sure bikes are in good working order, and the brakes are working correctly, too.
- Walkers need to make sure they use the sidewalks and cross at marked crossings as well. We have 2 school facilities staff who help with crossings in the morning and the afternoon. They are there all year to make sure everyone crosses safely. If you're listening to music with AirPods or headphones, please take them out before you cross so you can hear vehicles and instructions. Utilize crosswalk signals if they are present where you cross.
- Students who walk to school and home should always walk with friends and relatives. This way, you're safer in numbers. Report any suspicious circumstances quickly so the police department can look into these reports promptly. Things to try and remember: vehicle description - color, style, and stickers or markings on the vehicle. How many people were in the vehicle and a good description of the driver as possible.

Letter from the Mayor

Hello neighbors! March brought us another successful Town Meeting Day election. Many thanks to our City Clerk's Office, election workers, and volunteers for your great work in managing this beloved Vermont tradition, and congratulations to Councilors Renner and Hurd on their re-elections. Please join me in thanking these folks for their dedicated service! The City and School budgets and bond votes all passed. With the passage of Article 6, we'll reallocate existing debt to complete deferred paving on Reginald, Rogers, Bernard, and Gail Streets, by replacing curbing next year to support repaving and sidewalk repairs the following year. We're happy to use these existing funds to get this back on the annual paving schedule.

With the passage of Article 7, we're able to take up to \$4.6 Million of new debt for our local share of the Burlington-Winooski Bridge replacement, with state and federal funding covering 90% of the costs. This keeps the project on the timeline required by the federal RAISE grant that's allowing this significant infrastructure upgrade to happen, improving safety for all users. We'll continue to work towards reducing Winooski's

share if possible. Visit the project page for more details at burlingtonwinooski.bridg.vtransprojects.vermont.gov.

With the passage of the City budget, we'll increase staffing at the Fire Department to ensure adequate emergency response, and at the Winooski Memorial Library to support current open hours. This budget, and last year's budget, were both significantly higher than usual partly due to inflation, but also to address infrastructure and staffing needs to support our growing community. Over the past several years, we've taken on many significant projects: Main St. Revitalization, wastewater treatment plant upgrades, fixing Hickok Street, purchasing two new firetrucks, Community Services Department program expansions, and All-Resident Voting. Coupled with growth in our population and housing density, these have added a lot of expense to the budget for staffing and debt service.

As we look forward to the future, we'll focus on sustainability: We need to take a step back and consider the financial commitments we've already made, the list of projects in the queue, and community priorities, to make decisions about what core services the City must and can provide responsibly while maintaining affordability in Winooski.

From Your Local Representative

We are at the mid point of our 2024 Legislative Session so what better time to pause for updates on key state policy priority areas for Winooski?

Housing: This year the Governor's proposed budget falls woefully short of the \$200 million required to address homelessness and it reduces funding for housing development. Act 250 reform alone will not solve this crisis we are in, but a long-term strategic commitment will.

The Housing Committee is advancing a ten-year plan (H.829) to address the housing crisis. It includes 300 new beds for unhoused individuals and families, 7,500 additional homes and apartments, eviction prevention resources, and social services. This investment could transform Vermont's affordable-housing landscape.

Health and Wellness: The Health Care Committee is working on the Medicaid Expansion Act, H.721 — the most ambitious effort to improve access to affordable health care in over a decade. While large parts will be undergoing a technical analysis to lessen the burden on taxpayers, this bill will:

- Expand Medicaid eligibility to all Vermonters with incomes up to 312% of the federal poverty level.
- Prevent older Vermonters from falling off of the Medicare benefits "cliff"
- Allow young Vermonters to keep their Dr. Dinosaur benefits until age 26.

- Increase Medicaid reimbursement rates to our providers.
- Give small business owners an affordable option to provide their employees with health insurance through Medicaid.

Purpose and Access: You may already know that due to a long list of factors, our taxes are increasing. The good news is there are tools available that can save you money.

Two of our largest tax credits are the *Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)* and the *Child Tax Credit (CTC)*. The EITC is meant to offset taxes paid by low-wage earners, and the CTC offers a per-child amount to families.

If you own a home, file a homestead declaration! Two thirds of Vermonters are eligible for income-based property tax relief and filing the homestead declaration is the way to receive that discount.

Main Street Revitalization Project Update

Construction on the Winooski Main Street Revitalization Project will begin mid-April. The project will improve the roadway along the Main Street (U.S. Route 2/7) corridor, starting at the New England Central Railroad bridge near the intersection with Maple Street and extending to the Winooski-Colchester town line near the Winooski School District.

The Main Street Revitalization Project includes the installation of new stormwater infrastructure and sewer and water utilities, the relocation of aerial utilities, an enhancement of roadway aesthetics, and an upgrade of traffic signals and pedestrian and bicycle facilities.

Construction activities are anticipated to take place predominately Monday through Friday during the daytime hours. There will be some instances of night and weekend work when necessary. Construction will require single-lane closures with alternating one-way traffic; however, there will be short temporary road closures with detours.



In 2018, Howard Center’s Community Outreach team began providing mental health and social services in Winooski, collaborating closely with the Winooski Police Department. This partnership allows for a co-response approach to active calls involving mental health concerns and social service needs, ensuring comprehensive care and support for individuals in need of help or assistance.



“It’s incredible to see the impact of combining police work and social services. Every day is a chance to learn from each other and to deepen our understanding of how best to serve our community’s needs. Police are often the first to encounter individuals requiring assistance, making their referrals vital to our mission. Community Outreach meets with the department daily. This ongoing interaction informs and enhances interactions with the community through direct engagement and follow-up referrals from the police. Our efforts focus on proactive community engagement, we are frequently visible at community events and on the streets, emphasizing our commitment to being a part of the community. Community Outreach’s efforts are rooted in collaboration and direct communication to address the mental health and social service needs of the Winooski community.
