Welcoming our New Chief of Police, Justin Huizenga

I am pleased to announce that I have appointed Justin Huizenga, formerly a Winooski Police Department Lieutenant, to serve as Winooski's next Chief of Police.

After a rigorous national search and screening process (managed by Vermont-based law enforcement specialists JW Consulting), I am confident that Justin is the best possible next Police Chief for our community. Chief Huizenga brings to the role a deep commitment to community policing, improving the profession, and building meaningful relationships with residents, colleagues, and partners. The desire for these priorities were evident in all of the feedback we received for this role and the department.

Justin's law enforcement career of 18 years includes a degree in Criminal Justice from Champlain College, an Executive Development certification from Roger Williams University, and



experience as Patrol Sergeant, Detective, Lieutenant, and Interim Chief.

I appreciate the many community members who provided critical feedback not only to aid this decision, but to inform how the Police Department operates into the future. We received 347 responses to the community input survey, and numerous people participated in interviews or focus groups held by JW Consulting. The focus group invitations prioritized those who otherwise might not be heard through an online survey, including New Americans, youth, and seniors.

I am grateful to Justin for his willingness to step up to this level of leadership, and to everyone in the Winooski Police Department for continuing to provide excellent and professional service during the interim time between Chiefs.

Additional thanks are due to
Winooski Police Chief Advisory
Committee for their important work to
improve the search process and outcomes.
Justin and the Police Department have
already been ramping up their efforts on
community policing. Please stay tuned for
opportunities to connect with him and
other officers so we can all work together
towards our shared goal of safe, healthy,
connected people.

NOTES FROM THE DISTRICT OFFICE

Superintendent Update

Our district continues to work hard to provide a welcoming and productive space for our students. Every month, I produce a report to the Board where I cover everything from operations to learning and more, and I include pictures of our wonderful students in action. I invite you to look at these monthly reports, which you can find on our website under the "Board" section.

A critical piece of information in this month's report is our potential later start time for next year (by 15 minutes). After much discussion about the state of support systems for students in the district and the level of readiness of staff to meet the changing demands in education, I have concluded that our schools are under-equipped to promote consistent and relevant professional development that is embedded throughout the school year.

One major factor that contributes to this deficiency is the very limited contractual time in the day for teachers, staff, and administrators to engage in effective, efficient, and meaningful collaboration and collective learning. Staff meetings are usually carried out quickly in the short 30 minutes before students arrive at the classroom door, and professional learning is limited to little windows of opportunity here and there. As a strong believer in the power that professional learning and collaboration can



have in the quality of learning that our students receive, I am exploring the modification of the start time for our schools from 8:00am to 8:15am. This would still provide more than the legally required instructional time, putting us just above the average total instructional time in the region.

Currently, our teachers teach for more total minutes in the day than most schools in the area. The additional 15 minutes will make a significant difference in the flexibility that it provides administrators and staff to finally have more productive meetings and potentially allow us to initiate bi-weekly Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to allow teams of educators and staff to discuss student data and strategize best practices in response to the data.

I trust that the improved quality of instruction for our students resulting from this ongoing professional growth is a worthy exchange for these 15 minutes. I hope the community will support this change because I believe it will yield a higher quality of instruction and the ability to better personalize learning for students who need additional support. An announcement will be made concurrently with our new calendar.

School Board Update

Your involvement was critical to developing a budget that balances the need to maintain and expand services with the need to maintain affordability for our taxpayers. I also want to thank community members who engaged in the budget development process by attending presentations, watching board meetings, completing surveys, and emailing individual board members with questions and feedback.

Establishing a budget to present to the voters is one of the most important functions of the school board. Just as important is the board's role in monitoring the outcomes that result from the investments our community is making in our schools. As a Policy Governance board, we monitor outcomes through policy.



The most important policy we have is our District's Ends Statement: All students will graduate from the Winooski School District (WSD) college and career-ready at a cost supported by a majority of the Winooski community. WSD students will lead healthy, productive, and successful lives and engage with their local and global community.

Now that the budget process is complete,
I look forward to working with my Board
colleagues and the administration to define
key metrics and data sources to monitor this Ends

Statement over the coming year. How do we know our students are graduating college and career-ready? How do we know if they are leading healthy, productive, and successful lives? This work excites me most about being on the school board and work that I invite you all to participate in.

All community members are invited to attend school board meetings in person or online. We meet on the second Wednesday of the month at 6:00pm. The agenda is posted on the WSD website several days before the meeting (www.wsdvt.org).

I look forward to continuing to collaborate with my fellow board members, the administration, and community members to ensure that our investments in our students' futures produce excellent results.

The interactive session left an indelible mark on the first graders, igniting their curiosity and leaving them eagerly anticipating the upcoming eclipse. Health Office

A few reminders from the health office as we head into spring!

Spring Sports:

- If you have a student-athlete planning to participate in spring sports, they must have had a sports physical within the past two years, and we must have a copy on file.
- If your student-athlete has already played in a fall or winter sport, and we already have a copy on file, they are good to go. Please reach out to our athletic director or the nurses with any questions.

Kindergarten Registration:

One of my favorite days is kindergarten registration! I love seeing all the little ones and their families prepare for the next chapter of their lives. When you arrive at kindergarten registration, the health office will need the following information:

- Immunizations: copy of the complete set, incomplete set with date of next PCP appointment or religious exemption form
- Medical information: please plan on notifying the nurse if your child has a medical
 condition or will need to take prescription medications in the health office during
 the school day.

Illness:

Lastly, we still see an uptick in illnesses throughout the school year. Monitor your child's symptoms and call your primary care physician's (PCP) office when needed. It's still not too late to get the flu shot. Ask your child's PCP office if it's right for them.

Advantages: Child does not need to leave school, parent/guardian does not need to take time off from work




A Registered Dental Hygienist provides services through the 802 Smiles Dental Network.

PK-12th grade students are eligible for this program. This service does NOT take the place of your child's dental home. We recommend your child visit the dentist yearly for an exam/x-ray.

Looking forward, there are several big things on the horizon this year. We'll break ground on the Main Street Revitalization project this spring. Voters approved a \$23 million bond in 2019 to revitalize the Main Street corridor from the bridge above the Rotary to the

important Vermont tradition a success.



Colchester town line - adding an uphill bike lane, wider sidewalks, underground utilities, and improved crosswalks. For details visit *winooskivt.gov/mainstreet*, and save the date for a public meeting at the Winooski School District on March 20th.

Annual street resurfacing is planned for Pine, Shepard, and Hall streets this summer, and

pending approval of the bond vote on Town Meeting Day, Reginald, Bernard, Gail, and Rogers Streets will get new curbing installed ahead of paving and sidewalk repairs.

The hotel, parking garage, and workforce housing project downtown will continue construction this year, adding to the vibrancy of our downtown.

We'll move forward with the Champlain Housing Trust (CHT) to purchase and take over operations of the



O'Brien Community Center (OCC). CHT successfully runs a community center in Burlington and is committed to retaining the community mission of the building. Current tenants and community spaces will be retained, the library and health center spaces will be expanded, and CHT may add additional service providers to expand community support in Winooski.

Lastly, the City-wide reappraisal should wrap up in April, with new assessments sent to property owners in June. Thank you so much for your cooperation with the assessors during this time!

From Your Local Representative

Hi neighbors! The House has been reviewing our spending so far this year and have put forward our adjustments to the FY24 budget, with the House passing the FY24 Budget Adjustment Act (BAA), allocating \$8.69 billion, including \$2.44 billion from the General Fund. The House version of the BAA strategically invests in housing in order to get more affordable units built and updated while also allocating an additional \$13.2 million for emergency housing to address the needs of those experiencing homelessness. The House also recognized the need to support our municipalities impacted by the recent climate crisis and allocated \$56.59 million for flood relief. Overall the BAA goes on to support areas like human services, organic farming, dam studies, and post-retirement adjustments.

In the realm of public health, the House Human Services Committee advanced S.18, a bill that would ban flavored tobacco substitutes and e-liquids. Recognizing the alarming 89%

of Vermont youth aged 12-17 enticed by candy-flavored e-cigarettes, the bill proposes a ban on retail sales of such products, emphasizing youth prevention through school cessation programs and nicotine education. While it delays a menthol cigarette ban for equity review, it won't restrict other flavored tobacco products to align with federal laws. The Department of Health will monitor its progress and report back to the legislature in January 2026.

Lastly, addressing fiscal concerns for the Winooski School District, our superintendent and school board chair testified before the House Ways & Means Committee and expressed reservations about Act 127's 5% tax rate cap on budget increases. In their testimony, they focused on other districts inflating their budgets to exploit the cap, potentially leading to higher equalized tax rates. Facing a projected \$1 million loss in tax capacity due to decreased yield, our district is having to confront tough decisions such as property tax hikes, budget revisions, or necessary cuts. They recommended exploring a temporary revenue source to uphold Act 127's intent while mitigating the impact on districts like Winooski, ensuring equal access to educational resources amid budgetary challenges.

Main Street Revitalization

The City of Winooski invites you to attend a construction public meeting for the Winooski Main Street Revitalization project on **Wednesday, March 20, 2024**, starting at 6:30pm.

Community Created Art Installation in Rotary Park

Downtown Winooski is partnering with long-time resident and local artist, Terry Zigmund, to build a community created stained glass and tile mosaic to be permanently installed in Rotary Park. This mosaic will visually celebrate the vibrant and culturally diverse city that Winooski is. The concept for the design will be based on a quilt, measuring approximately 4' tall x 8' wide. Throughout the 2024

event season, community



members will be invited to create individual 4"x 4" mosaics that will be combined to create a quilt pattern. Each participant will create their mosaic using glass and tile colors that reflect their relationship to Winooski. For instance: I have lived in Winooski my entire life, I have lived in Vermont for my entire life, I have lived in the United States for my entire life, I came to Winooski from another country. Each prompt will be represented by a different color. When assembled, our quilt of 288 4" squares, will reflect the diversity of our community.
